

Money is Oil

Washington (NC)—The Dominican Republic's first freely elected leader in 38 years arrived in the nation's capital to study first-hand how the U.S. Alliance for Progress program works.

During his stay, silver-haired President-elect Juan Bosch, 53, will have expert teachers—President Kennedy, Secretary of State Dean Rusk, Alliance Administrator Teodoro Moscoso and other government officials.

"This Alliance is important to us because, as an automobile needs oil, democracy needs to feed on improved living conditions—houses, schools, hospitals. It is not only money we need, but moral support in our effort to make democracy work," Bosch said.

Before coming here, Bosch and his wife, Carmen, spent the Christmas holidays in South Beach, Fla., visiting their son, Patrick, 16, a junior at St. Joseph's High School. The youth is staying at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Robert H. Ackerman and will remain in South Beach to complete his studies at the high school. The couple also have a daughter, Barbara, 11, back home.

Bosch was 24 years in exile when he returned to the Dominican Republic and won the presidential election by 300,000 votes a month ago. He will take office as President on February 27.

BOSCH HEADS the Dominican Revolutionary Party (PRD), described as moderately leftist. During the election campaign he was accused by Father Leticio Garcia, S.J., of having Marxist-Leninist leanings. In an election eve radio-television debate with the President-elect the Jesuit modified his accusations. Bosch said he and the priest settled their differences amicably.

Police Guard Christians in Israel

Jerusalem (NC)—Police have been put on guard duty outside all Christian institutions in Israel, Jerusalem, in the wake of demonstrations in which windows of a Protestant school were broken and Catholic nuns were spat at.

The demonstrations were attributed to a group of young Orthodox Jewish families. The Protestant school, where the windows were broken is a Finnish missionary school. The demonstrators protested Christian proselytism of Jews, charging that the Finnish school has a "non-Christian" Jewish among its pupils.

Three Sisters of Charity who were walking in the vicinity with their pupils at the time were spat at and jeered by some of the demonstrators. Stones were thrown at them, but without serious injury.

The Israeli Foreign Ministry expressed its genuine indignation at the incidents and said that the Cabinet indicated its regret. The Ambassador of Finland had made an official inquiry, and the French consul general has protested—France traditionally being the "protector" of Catholic nuns in the Holy Land.

Berlin (NC)—The Roman Catholic and Baptist Churches in Belotussia, a republic in the western part of the Soviet Union, are attracting not only older people but the youth as well, according to the Communist party newspaper Pravda.
