Rochester's two skating stars took two more championships this past weekend. Janice Smith, a St. Agnes High student, won the intermediate girls' title in the Great Lakes Speed Skating championship in Milwaukee...

Eleven-year-old Sue Warden, who is still in need of a sponsor for her trips, won the 440-yard event Sunday after taking the 220 Saturday.

Miss Smith, in the Middle West to practice for an Olympic bid later this winter, scored victories in the 220-yard and half-mile intermediate girls races, but fell and had to settle for a second in the quarter-mile event.

The two firsts and second easily gave Miss Smith enough points for the class title. Sue is recognized as one of the top young skaters in the country.
