Third Order To Meet

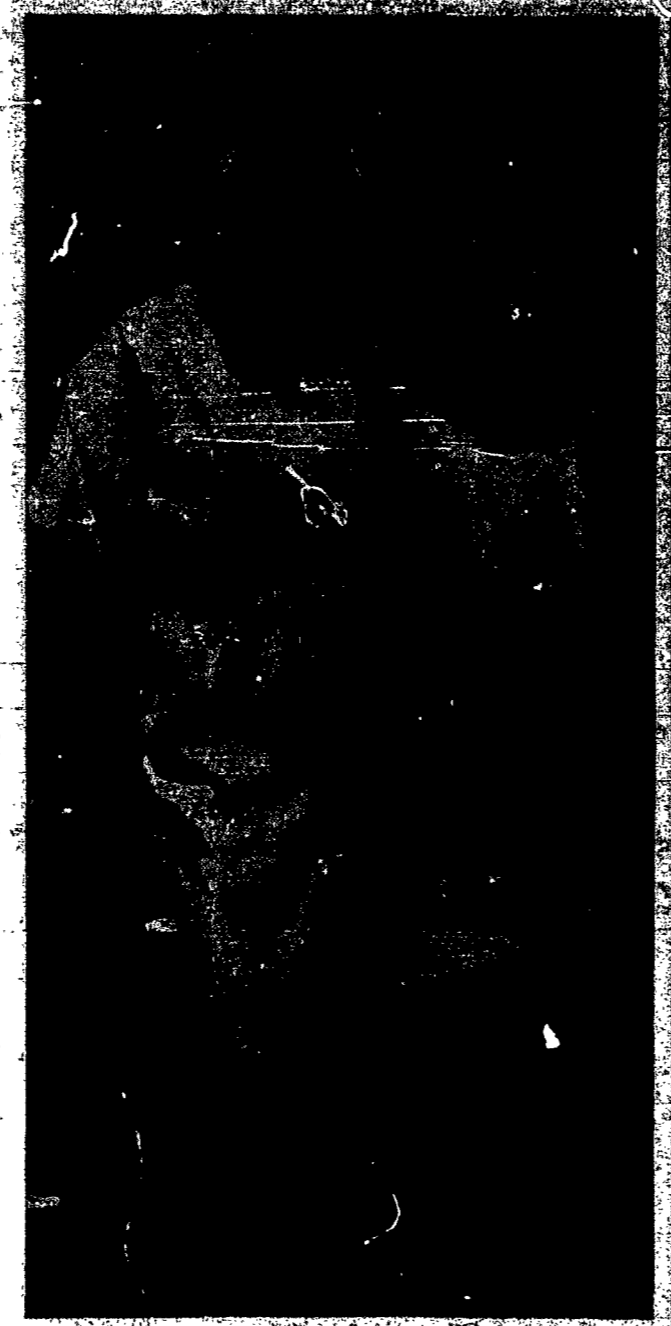
