National Police Week will be celebrated in Rochester with a full program of activities scheduled to begin Sunday, May 12 and terminating Saturday, May 18. Henry H. Jensen, Executive Deputy Chief, was named general chairman. Commissioner of Public Safety Donald J. Corbett and Police Chief William M. Lombard are honorary chairmen. The week will open Sunday, May 12 at 6:30 a.m. with some 300 city, county and state law enforcement agents and city and county officials taking part in the Annual Police Holy Name Society Communion Mass at St. Joseph's Church. The Communion breakfast, which will follow, will be held at the Manger Hotel. Bishop Kearney will be the principal speaker. Commissioner of Public Safety Donald J. Corbett, on behalf of National Police Week and to the Rochester Bureau of Police and Personnel, will present the Commissioner's Trophy to the Bishop, Commissioner of Investigation Charles J. Conroy, and police staffs will be present for the special services.

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Other activities will be held throughout the week highlighted by a National Police Week Luncheon at the Manger Hotel Wednesday, May 12 at 12:15 p.m. Albert O.
