GOD LOVE YOU!

When you read this column, I will be in Rome making an annual report to the Holy Father and his Congregation of the Propagation of the Faith on how well we have fulfilled our stewardship during the past year.

As the representative of the Holy Father's Pontifical Mission Societies in the United States, we are responsible for the following duties:

1. To inspire the bishops, priests and faithful of the United States to aid the Holy Father in caring for 80,000 schools; 10,000 hospitals and dispensaries; 2,000 orphanages; 400 leprosaria; 500 homes for the aged; and 300,000 missionaries in various parts of the world.
2. To inspire the faithful of the United States to fulfill the words of the Holy Father that he is to be "first and principally aided." The Pontiff does not say that he is to be uniquely aided but that, as Vicar of Christ, he is to be the first one thought of in missionary aid; secondly, the principal part of the aid is to be given to him.

Knowing the duties that have been imposed upon us as we make our report, suppose we asked you to take over it this point. How would you feel if the Holy Father asked you how much the Catholics of the United States gave him for all the Missions of the world last year? Especially if you had to answer, "Twenty-eight cents!" Would you boast of the fact by saying, "Your Holiness, every American Catholic so loves the Missions that he has denied himself, throughout the 365 days, the equivalent of one package of cigarettes or the equivalent of one-half a cocktail. The richest country in the world has sunk the Cross deep into its own heart to make this generous offering of twenty-eight cents?" Would you say that? Well, how do you think we are going to feel? Aren't there 100,000 of you who could send \$10 to The Society for the Propagation of the Faith right now? If you don't, I'm going to lose my job!

GOD LOVE YOU to J.E. for \$5 "Today I was feeling absolutely depressed and convinced that I wasn't going to be able to dig out from under a mass of assignments. Then I read your column and my sense of proportion was restored. High Evaluation Given At Nazareth Academy

Nazareth Academy's preliminary report from the visiting committee of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools averaged from Very Good to Excellent in all areas evaluated. These areas included: Program of Studies, Subject Fields, Student Activity Program, Instructional Materials, Services—Library and Visual Aid, Guidance Services, Health Services, School Plant, and School Staff and Administration.

A 17-member committee, under the chairmanship of Alexander L. Arning, prepared the report after a three-day visit to the school Feb. 17-20.

THE COMMITTEE was impressed by the extensive study which had been made of new trends and the wide variety of offerings in the program of studies. They noted especially the following features: enriched programs for honors groups, homogeneous grouping flexible enough to permit different classifications of the same student in different subjects, experiments with team teaching, and the use of modern tools of instruction.

In reference to the staff, the committee cited the outstanding leadership of the principal, the loyalty and efficiency of the administrative assistants, the alertness of the staff in the use of modern materials and tools of instruction, in team teaching, seminars, and curriculum studies.

Vocations Talk Given At Mothers' Breakfast

Hornell—Vocations, their responsibilities and rewards, were discussed by Mrs. Andrew Lamb at the annual Communion breakfast for members of St. Ann's Mothers' Club and their daughters.

THERE WERE more than 100 at the breakfast which followed the Holy Mass in St. Ann's Church. The breakfast served at the Knights of Columbus Home on River Street by members of the Hornell Council. Mrs. Francis Noble, president of the Mothers' Club, was toastmistress. She expressed appreciation to Mrs. Anthony Lamb and her arrangements committee.

Mrs. Lamb, a third grade teacher at Hornell's Lincoln School, emphasized the importance of preparing for a definite vocation early in the student's school career.

"Deciding on a vocation requires prayers, especially to the Holy Ghost, for enlightenment. After a career is selected, at least tentatively, the high school guidance department through its testing program can offer valuable assistance in directing the student towards the courses for which he is best fitted."

The satisfying elements of a teaching career were related by Mrs. Lamb through several anecdotes. Requisites for the teaching profession include a genuine love of children, patience, understanding and a sense of humor.

"Humor, which really is the ability to laugh at yourself, is essential to the success of any vocation. The gift of laughter is a precious one and must be dear to the Heart of God. After all, He reserved it for His most beloved creatures—human beings."

"You are aware of the joyousness of the religious life every time you step into a convent. The quiet radiance of a nun's face shows the inner serenity which comes from a complete conformance to the Will of God. That's the secret of success in any vocation—whether it be in the religious, single or married state."
