**A WORD TO THE RICH:**

"He Who was rich became poor for our sakes that we might become rich." St. Paul applies these words to Our Lord, Who emptied Himself of the glory of His Divinity to make us spiritually impoverished souls rich in His grace. And that same Lord made you rich in a material sense. Oh yes, you worked hard, or you guarded your inheritances, or you invested well, but the Lord is still the first cause of your wealth. "What have you that you have not received?"

It is much easier for you to save your soul than a famished "fellow" in Egypt or a migrable-cliff dweller in a Latin America "favela." You can give in Christ's Name. But the poor have to sink down into the depths of their souls and make an act of resignation and submission to God's Will. You say you are generous? You boast that you gave \$100,000 to build a \$3,000,000 church or \$250,000 to construct a library? Fine! But are you really satisfied with what you have done, or were you "pressurized" by agents, public relations officials or drive "ha-tchmen"? Did you give supernaturally or did you give naturally? Did it profit you for eternity or did it give you a bronze plaque in time?

Measure your gifts with the rules that Our Lord lay down for giving:

1) Our Lord said we should give to the poor. When you are a poor man, you are a beggar, "call in not the rich, but the poor." He meant that you should treat the distressed of the world as though their need was not a stigma but a claim. The needy catechists in Korea, the impoverished priests of Rhodesia — these are the men to benefit in the light of the life to come.

2) Our Lord said we should give anonymously. "Do not let thy left hand know what thy right hand is doing." Never notice how much money you give, when you "contribute" than when there is a collection. The ego wants satisfaction in the first instance, because it always carries tin cups because the giver gets a ring of satisfaction, as he hears his coin clink in the cup. But the Lord wants complete anonymity. He would have your gift take wings so you could never see where it went.

3) Our Lord said we should give to the poor because "they have nothing to repay these gifts; for they shall be repaid at the resurrection of the poor." The rich could repay you, honor you, put you on a board, but the poor can do nothing. Therefore, the Lord will have to reward you. The saddest words in Sacred Scripture are: "Thou hast already received thy reward."

Those of you who are rich and who want to give to the poor of the world so that no one else but the Vicar of Christ makes the distribution, write to me. I will reply personally to help you save souls.

**McQuaid Runners Take Elmira Relays' Title**

Sports activity on two fronts last week brought McQuaid Jesuit High a major track success and a baseball winning streak of seven games. At Parker Field, Elmira, last Friday the Knights sped to three relay victories and the team championship of the 12th Annual Elmira Relays.

In taking the first place trophy over 16 other schools, including defending champion Aquinas and county powerhouse Webster, McQuaid broke meet records in the 440 and 880 relays and established the standard in a new event, the mile medley.

THE SPRINT foursome of Russ Dalba, Bill Becker, Dick Durkin, and Bill Bruckel ran 44.2 in the 440, demolishing a 5-year record of 46.0, and came back with a 1:33.0 clocking in the 880, again snapping a 5-year mark, this one at 1:34.7. The Knights had tough competition in both races from Ithaca High, but won with something to spare each time.

In the mile medley, McQuaid took first over Aquinas and picked up its 1613 point margin. John Amann, Don Landis, Ralph Camardo, and Eric Kendrick covered the distance in 3:45.34 seconds better than the time that Aquinas had posted in the first section of the race. Camardo's 220 leg gave Kendrick a slight lead, and the 15-year-old freshman really poured it on for his 890, clocking 2:01, best this season for a Monroe County runner.

**Sacred Heart Closed Retreat**

IN BASEBALL, the Knights posted a 3-1 win over Aquinas and a 3-2 squeaker over Batavia to raise their season's mark to 7-4. Remarkably, all of the wins have come in succession after an opening string of 4 losses.

Lefty Dave Colmer hurled his third straight shutout to turn back Aquinas. His batting support came from Terry Dunlavey, who lofted a 2-run homer in the fourth, and Joe Miller who connected for a circuit in the fifth.

At Batavia, righty Sam Lannone yielded two runs in the first inning, then settled down to throw a shutout over the final six frames. McQuaid waited until the last inning before pulling out the decision. Trail-ling 2-1, the Knights reversed the count on a walk, an error, and singles by Dunlavey and Tony Leonardo.

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
