

## Physical Fitness Tests Given At Nazareth Hall

Last week at Nazareth Hall, 12 of 18 boys passed the test, or a total of 73 per cent. A total of 73 per cent of the fifth grade students or 16 of 22 were successful.

Another 75 per cent passed in the sixth grade with 12 of the 16 boys in that grade being physically fit. The seventh grade had 14 of 20 grades pass for a total of 70 per cent.

The eighth grade boys were the most successful, as 14 of the 18 boys in that grade passed the physical fitness test. A total of 77 per cent were graded as physically fit.

The test was given to the boys in grades 5 through 8. Of the 24 boys in the third grade, 15 of 75 per cent passed.

## Fisher Seniors Offered Record Total Of Grants

St. John Fisher College students have been offered a record total of \$81,534 in scholarships, assistantships and fellowships. Another new high recorded in the college's placement statistics is the number of job interviews conducted on campus, 681 compared to 438 last year.

TWO INDIVIDUAL records were set by seniors Paul Hany and Richard Hoyle.

Hany, an accounting major and outstanding debater, received 23 job offers (highest: \$7,200), including 6 from national accounting firms, 2 from industrial firms, 6 from federal agencies and 9 from state agencies. He elected, however, to enter Syracuse University's M.B.A. program after being offered a \$2,100 assistantship.

Hoyle was offered 15 assistantships for graduate study in physics. Among the colleges offering grants were: Polytechnic Institute of Brooklyn, Iowa State, University of Florida, State University of Iowa, University of Notre Dame, Kent State University, Washington University, University of Pittsburgh, Colorado State University, New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology, University of Kansas and three separate awards from the University of Utah, including a National Defense Education Act Fellowship valued at \$7,200 and one from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration valued at \$8,400.

He will attend the University of Southern California where he won a \$2,200 assistantship for three years.

Latest placement figures show that 29 students out of a class of 107 will enter graduate school in the fall; 28 have accepted jobs in business and industry; 19 will enter military service; 8 will be employed by the state or federal government; and 6 will teach. There are 6 scholastics in the class and 11 seniors are undecided about their future plans.

Eleven married men are included in this year's graduating class.

The afternoon's first race went to McQuaid's 880-yard relay foursome of Russ Dalba, Bill Becker, Dick Burns and Bill Bruckel in a fast 1:33. Burns had the key leg of the victory, bringing the Knights back from an 8-yard deficit against Franklin.

In the mile-medley relay, McQuaid used Burns and Bruckel along with lead-off man John Amann and anchor man Eric Kendrick, taking a second to West High's record-breaking 4:40.9 time. Kendrick touched off about seven yards behind West's Jerry Stoll, caught his opponent on the first lap, then lost out to Stoll's 2:00.9 clocking which left the McQuaid freshman behind on the final turn.

The Knights took another brace of runner-up awards in the four-man shot put, losing by a foot to Greece-Olympia's 176 feet-plus effort. Seniors Steve Tisa, Bob Michlewicz and Joe Moore and Soph Paul Saffler did the McQuaid putting, setting a new school mark of 175 feet, 8 inches for the event.
