Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Georger, 138 Marion St., were married June 10, 1913 in St. Augustine's Church.

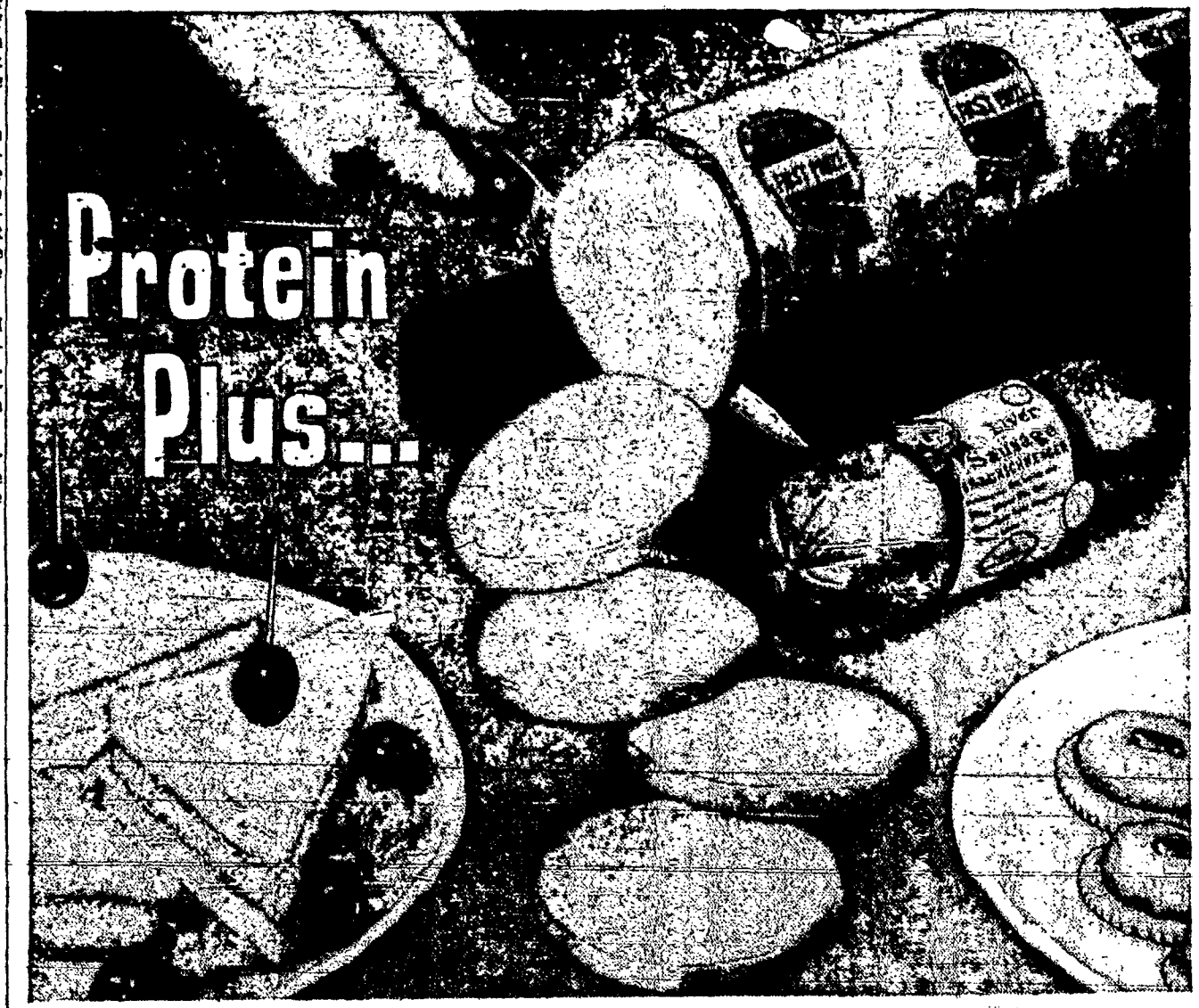
