The Columbian Squires is also an affiliate of the Youth Department of the NCWC in Washington, D.C.



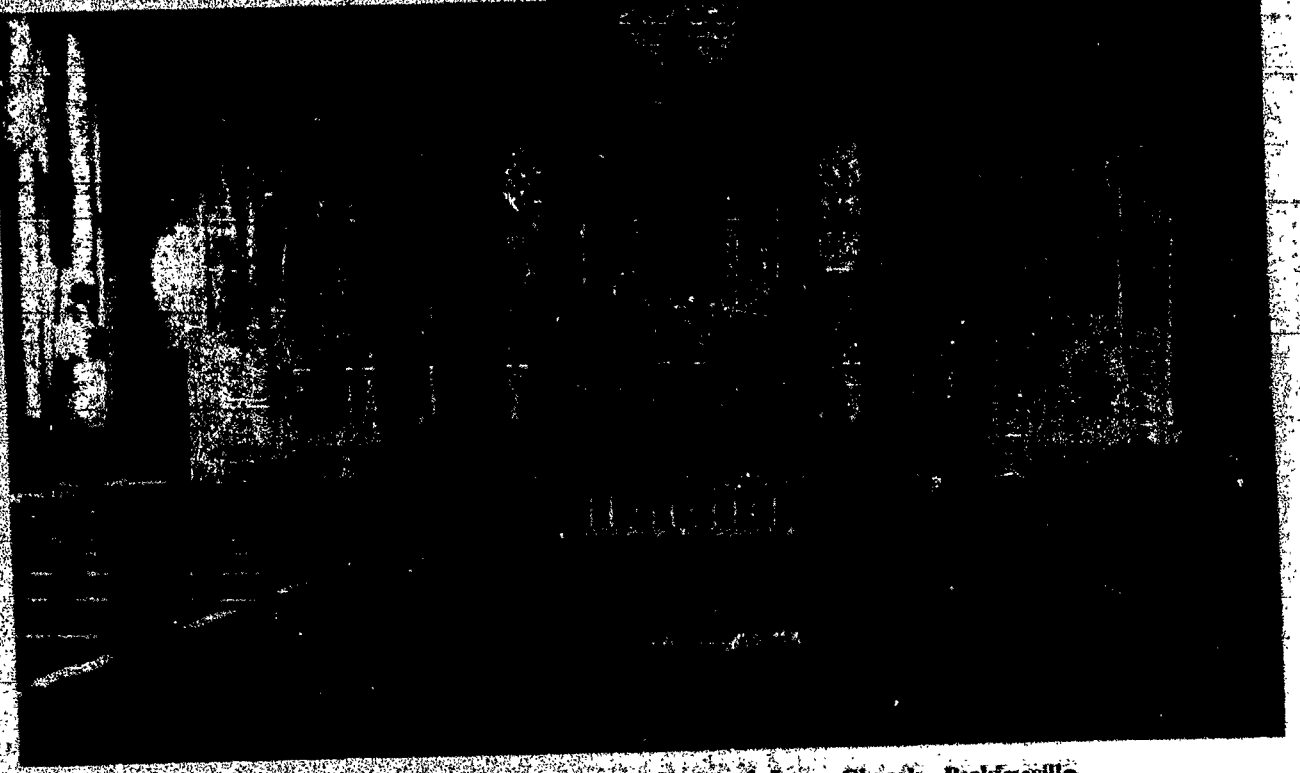

Church Redecoration In Perkinsville

Perkinsville—Redecoration of the interior of Sacred Heart of Jesus Church, here, which is attracting wide area attention is described, this week, by the Rev. John C. O'Donnell, pastor, who supervised the project.

"Our church of the Sacred Heart has just been beautifully redecorated in the interior in new and soft pale colors," Father O'Donnell replied to a request for a description.

"Starting with the ceiling which is in a cool ivory color, which has enhanced the structural details of ceiling and given the ceiling more unity and consequently more strength than what it was before when it was all subdivided into many little colors, the trusses only have a little trace of color on a moulding.

"In the center of the ceiling where there is a carved sunburst, it has been gilded in a soft gold tone to bring out the details.

THE PAINTINGS on ceiling of the Apostles and some of the saints have also been refreshed by washing and retouching, and encircled with a stencil design so as to frame them in a quiet but rich red which adds to the paintings and gives an added touch of agreeable color to ceiling and on walls where there are other paintings.

"The walls are painted in a soft gold tone which gives a suitable background bringing out the beautiful Stations of the Cross and the colorful stained glass windows.

"The Sanctuary being focal point of the church has all been unified. Ceiling and walls in rich gold tone but subdued and

painting in the Sanctuary were cleaned and new border and silk gold leaf line.

"The statues in church were all cleaned and retouched. The Stations of the Cross which go around the walls of nave were cleaned, retouched and the supporting brackets painted differently than the walls so that the whole group of figures of the stations would stand out. Final

of the interior of the church was decorated and finished by the widely known firm of church decorators R. Attunasi & Sons of Rochester, N.Y. under the supervision of M. Martirano the church artist and decorator, of stations would stand out. Final

Expansion and improvement of parking facilities for employees and staff of St. Mary's Hospital of Rochester and visitors using the hospital parking lots was announced today.

Officials of the hospital said that inadequate parking facilities have hampered hospital operations for some time, and, in conjunction with major additions to the hospital plant, the development of additional parking areas was deemed vital to the hospital.

Uniformed attendants will supervise the parking of all vehicles, new lighting, surfacing, and control equipment is being installed to provide adequate parking for all visitor and employees vehicles.
