## Dachau Victim Possible Saint

International Falls, Minn. — (RNS) — A Catholic priest here who survived the horror of Dachau has left for his native Poland to testify before an ecclesiastical court considering the beatification of his uncle.

Both Father Chester Kozal, pastor of St. Thomas Catholic Church, and his uncle, Auxiliary Bishop Michael Kozal of Wladislav, Poland, were prisoners in the Nazi concentration camp where 238,000 persons died in World War II.

FATHER KOZAL, 51, said he was the only witness to the death of his uncle. He said the bishop had been a victim of a Nazi "mercy killing" after he had contracted typhoid fever in 1943.

"I believe I owe my life to him," the priest said. "He was a holy man, full of grace."

"A year before he died he told me he would sacrifice his life to God if God would spare the lives of the other priests at Dachau. He said to me, 'Don't worry, you will get out of this place.'"

Father Kozal said his testimony before a diocesan court in Posen, Poland, will deal with the circumstances of his uncle's death, not the prophecies. He will be the last witness to testify at the diocesan level.
