## Help Unwanted

The well-meaning, "I'll get a summer job, help with college expenses" has been "dull-in" equipment for high school in America for a long, long time.

And it has been a reality for a long, long time. High school graduates were willing and able to take on all sorts of jobs to help defray the expenses of their college years or to get started in the world if school days were over. Far from choosers, they worked on construction projects, on farms, ran elevators, did office work, waited on customers. They served as copy boys or copy girls in newspaper offices. They filled the ranks of the armed forces, they moved lawns, washed cars, typed letters and speeches.

SEMI-SKILLED, nevertheless they were welcomed into the labor market. Their enthusiasm and willingness to work will a definite asset.

The class of 1963, graduating with "Pomp and Circumstance" finds a far different picture. Today it is a case of "circumstances take over."

What do they discover?

They find verification of what they feared for the past few job-seeking months: "Sorry, we have nothing." "Too bad, son, but we're laying people off rather than taking anybody on." "Unfortunately, we are taking on no summer help this year. You might leave your name and maybe next summer..."

The telling all dressed up in the hose, heels, gloves, the coat, the shawl, the carefully rehearsed approach, respectfully poised, dignified — those, all in vain as the final exit line echoes, "Don't call us we'll call you if anything turns up."

This is the situation at our house, although the same at houses after house all over the country.

According to a recent Associated Press report out of the Labor Department, one out of every four in the ranks of the unemployed last month was a teenager, the highest level of teen-age unemployment since the bureau began keeping its adjusted records back in 1949.

Secretary of Labor Wirtz says, "These figures reflect a critical situation, a situation which could develop into one of the most explosive problems in the Nation's history."

The situation has been expected for some time by Labor Department experts who predicted that the "baby boom" following World War II would hit the labor market this summer as the first wave of post-war youngsters graduated from high school.

Rationalized, of course. It is easy to see that there are many more young people competing for fewer jobs. Since automation has taken on many of the tasks formerly performed by teenagers, the human worker is less needed.

ELEVATORS have buttons instead of operators; largely grocery, novelty and drug stores serve yourself with few clerks needed; computers have taken on task after task. Duplicating machines make more copies faster than human fingers can possibly do.

### Christmas In Japan Talk

Given Scouts

Their opportunity to spread devotion in a foreign land, a requirement for the Marian Award came about for Girl Scouts of St. Louis Parish, Pittsburgh as reported here.

TO LEARN how Christmas is celebrated in various countries, one of the girls, Mary Fee suggested that the Troop invite Miss Tomoko Fujiwara of Tokyo, Japan to a meeting. Miss Fujiwara who is spending a year in the home of Mary's family while doing special studies at Nazareth College is a graduate of Nazareth College, Tokyo and was a classmate of the Crown Princess Michiko.

The girls said they were impressed with her talk. "You must remember — my country is a pagan country," she said, "so we do not really celebrate Christmas as Christian countries do. But the Christians celebrate as they see the American soldiers do. The celebration seemed so delightful that even the pagans began to do the same: to have decorated trees and give gifts and invite all their families together for dinner. But they thought it was just another day to honor their families — as a matter of fact, they thought it was a day to honor their children as we do on Girl's Day in April and on Boy's day in May — and at midnight when they saw us going out to church, they would gather at Ginza Street (which is very much like your Times Square in New York City) and cheer and shout firecrackers and make so much noise that in church could hear the noise from the street.

"But gradually they began to realize that we were celebrating a little more than just that, so some of them began to go to church with their Christian neighbors, and last Christmas Eve so many had gone to either Catholic or Protestant churches that the diminished noise was clearly noticeable to us for the first time. So you see, maybe through the celebration of Christmas my country will become Christian."

The Scouts enjoyed her story so much that they invited her to accompany them on their pilgrimage to Antwerp. In preparation for the trip, a short story with illustrations was prepared so she could read about the martyrs and understand the purpose of the shrine. She found the story so interesting that she read it twice.

This story, along with the museum at the shrine was her first introduction to Indian lore, and she intends to tell the story of the heroic missionaries to her friends when she returns to Tokyo.
