Pastor Refuses To 'Mock God'

Herkimer, N.Y. — (RNS) — A Lutheran pastor here said he would not deliver the invocation at a high school commencement because of the U.S. Supreme Court decision banning required Bible readings in public schools.

The Rev. Donald A. Ebel of Trinity Lutheran Church contended an invocation is a religious exercise as outlined in the court's decision. He had been invited to give the invocation at Herkimer High School's graduation.

"We mock God when we hear him from our schools for 12 years of a child's education and then have the nerve to invoke his presence and ask his blessing at the final public school session," Mr. Ebel said in a letter to the school principal.

Editors Attend UN Seminar

United Nations — (RNS) — United Nations officials urged here that religious news media give wider coverage to U.N. affairs.

At a special meeting of 75 Catholic editors representing publications affiliated with the Catholic Press Association (CPA), U.N. Office of Public Information spokesmen said the same status and facilities would be given to religious media and their representatives as is given the secular press.

The two-day meeting, sponsored by the CPA and the International Press Union, was called to acquaint Catholic editors with U.N. operations and to answer questions they had about the nature, work and future of the world body.

Brian Urquhart, a political affairs expert with the C.N.U. told the Catholic editors that the U.N. troops were not responsible for the massacres of priests and nuns during the conflict with Katanga forces of Moïse Tshombe.

"While there was a grain of truth in some reports, most of the atrocity stories were grossly exaggerated," he claimed. Most of the "exaggerated" reports, he added, had been disseminated to news media by "extremists" writing out of the Camp.

Funeral Mass for Eugene P. Petrossi was offered in St. Philip Neri Church, June 24. Mr. Petrossi, president of Triplet Construction Co. died June 20, 1963 following a bulldozer accident. He resided at 658 Winthrop Road South.
