### College Chaplains Meeting

Minneapolis. — Thirty-six Catholic priests from all parts of the nation are spending three weeks at the University of Minnesota, training for what one of them called "the most challenging work in the priesthood."

They have been assigned to serve as Newman Club chaplains on Non-Catholic college and university campuses.

Lack of personnel to work with them and student indifference are two of the biggest problems that the chaplains encounter, according to Father Charles W. Albright of Washington, a Paulist priest who is coordinating secretary of the National Newman Apostolate.

SOME STUDENTS have difficulty seeing the relevance of their faith to the rest of university life, he noted.

Father Charles Borgognoni, Newman chaplain at Syracuse (N. Y.) University, said the questions he encounters most in counseling with students relate to the Catholic Church's teaching on marriage, divorce and birth control.

He had high praise for students found in college today, describing them as "vibrant, alive, eager to learn, questioning."

"They want to be sold on something," he commented. "The question is — who is going to sell it?"

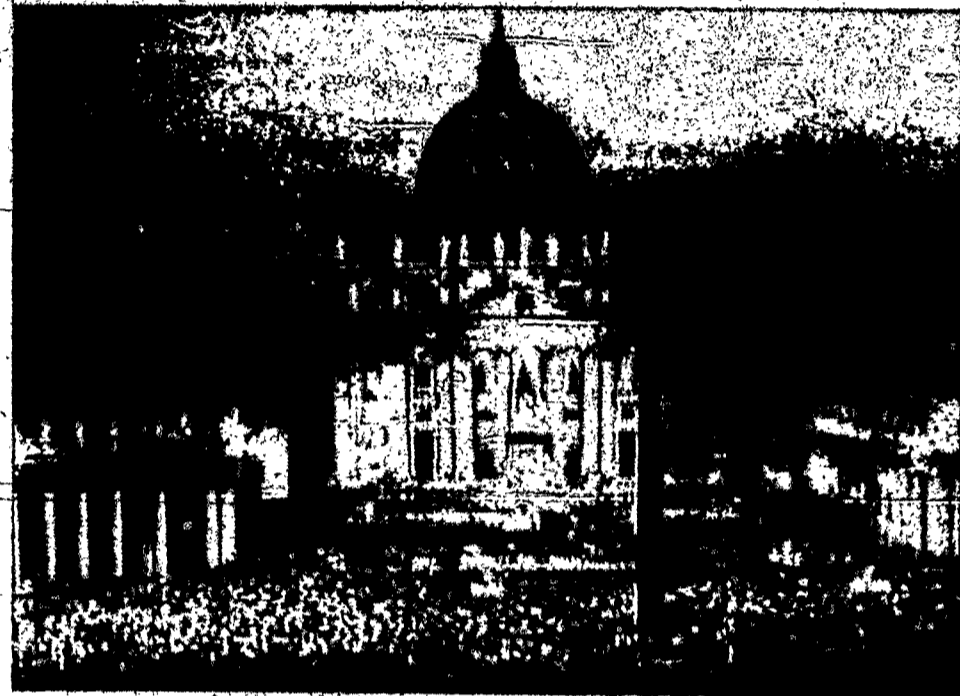

### School Aid Debate

## NEA Asks 'Elbow Room'

Des Moines, — (NC) — The National Education Association has asked the House to give it "elbow room" in its policy of total opposition to any proposal for federal school aid which includes help for education in nonpublic schools.

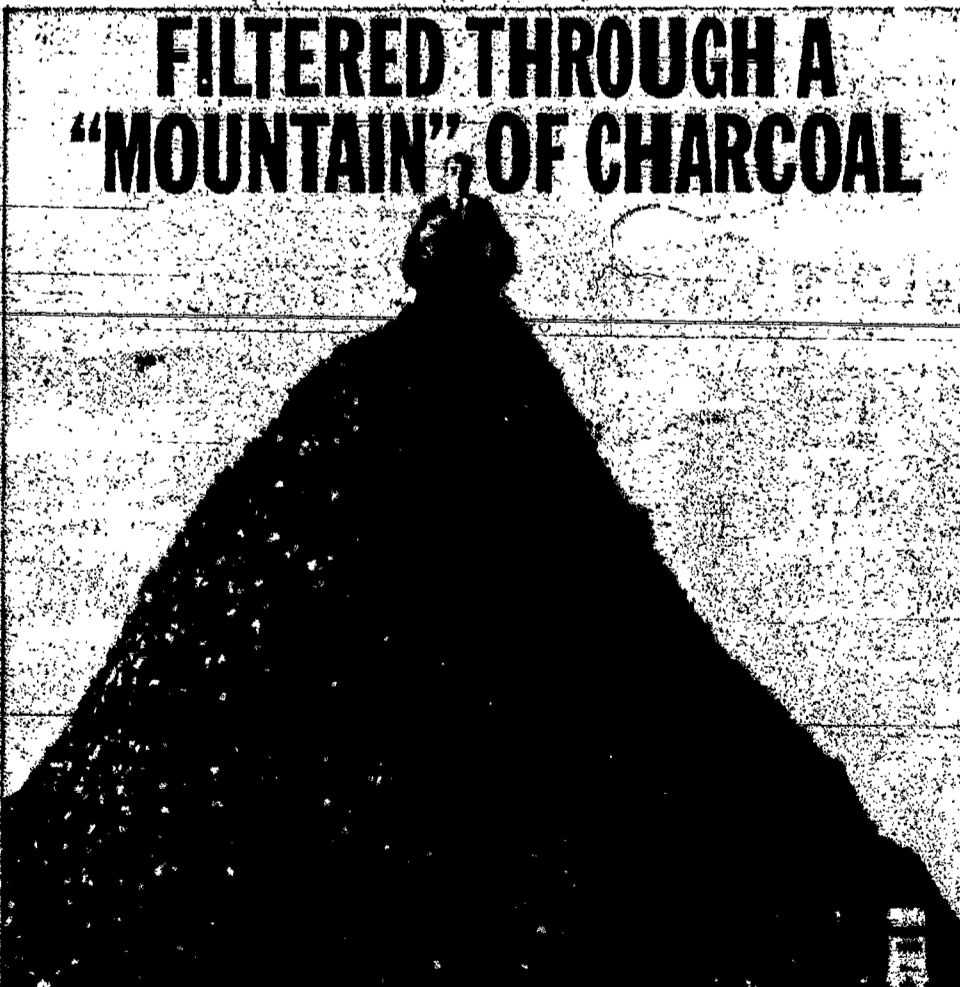
The new policy is not a blank check, Delegates were told that the NEA still would oppose federal education aid which it felt would be in violation of Church-State relations.

It also called for a judicial review clause to determine the constitutionality of legislation which would involve church-religious activities.

Spokesman for the NEA's legislative committee — its influential lobbyists in Washington — told the 5,500 delegates

After 30 minutes of debate, a resolution on the amendment was called for. It was indefinite. A standing vote was then taken and the parliamentarian ruled it was sufficient to kill the amendment.

The amendment from the floor, presented by an Illinois educator, John Bufford, would have added to the text of the prepared resolution a clause that "in keeping with the letter and spirit of federal and state constitutions, federal grants for institutional use (should) be made exclusively to public primary and secondary schools and to higher education."
