It is not often that we think of the "shameful" sufferings of Our Lord, but Scripture speaks of Him that way: "That we fix our eyes on Jesus, the origin and crown of all Faith, Who to win His prize of blessedness endured the Cross and made light of its shame, Jesus Who now sits on the right of God's throne."

Part of this shame was twice being stripped of His garments. He Who clothed the lilies of the field had not where-with to clothe Himself; He Who clothed the lepers with skins appeared on the Cross, in the language of St. Paul as "a leper"; He Who made coats of skins for Adam and Eve when they were naked in the garden was then stripped of His seamless robe.

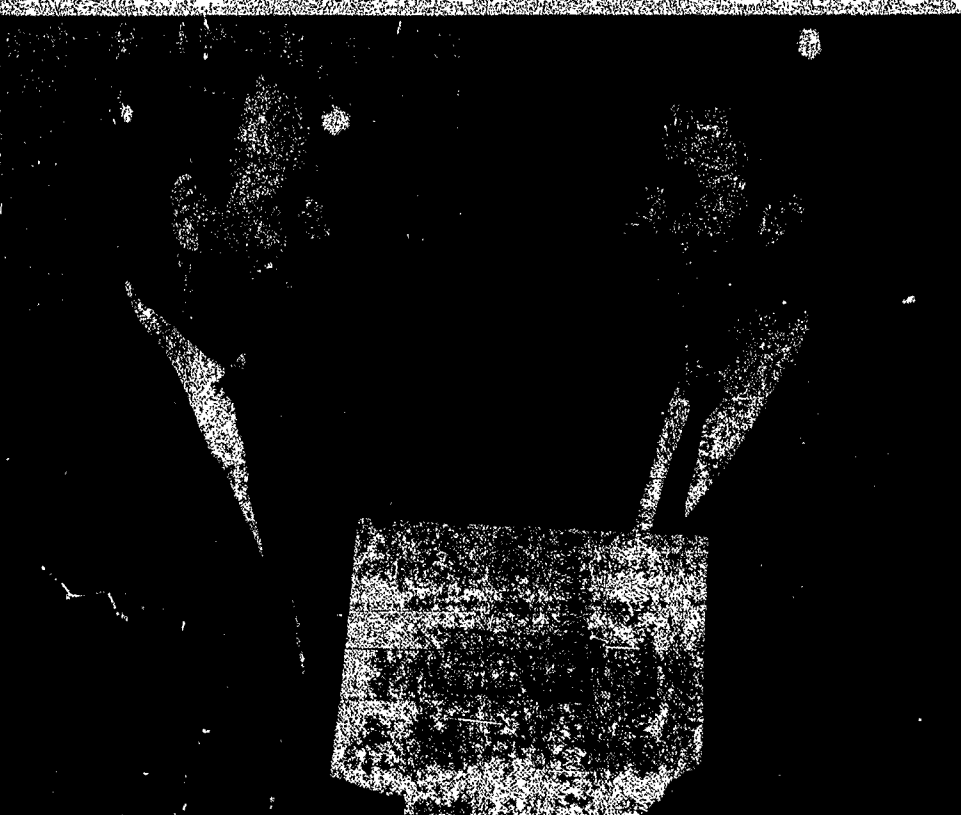

**Fisher Receives Alumni Award**

THE AWARD to St. John Fisher College was for improvement in alumni giving in private men's colleges. In the 1962 Alumni Fund Drive, St. John Fisher College increased its alumni participation 21% over the prior year to an all-time high of 81%.
