## State Dept. No Comment On Vietnam

Washington — (NC) — The State Department has refused comment on a charge by 12 Non-Catholic religious leaders that there is a lack of religious freedom in South Vietnam.

The clergyman have bought newspaper ads that included a photo of the Buddhist priest Quang Duc after he set himself on fire (June 11) in a Saigon street and burned to death. A caption under the photo says: "He died to protest South Vietnam's religious persecution of Buddhists (70 per cent of the population)."

In the ad, the clergyman, calling themselves the "United Vietnam Committee," also say: "We protest our country's aid to those who deny him (the Buddhist priest) religious freedom."

The ad quotes from an editorial in the June 17 edition of the N.Y. Times which stated: "A majority of South Vietnam's people are Buddhists, yet the ruling oligarchy, dominated by members of the Roman Catholic Ngo family, has discriminated against Buddhists in many spheres."

State Department press officer Richard J. Phillips said he could not comment on the religious issue in South Vietnam "since it is a sensitive internal problem."

Clergymen whose names appear on the newspaper ad include Episcopate Bishop James A. Pike of California; Rev. Reinhold Niebuhr, professor emeritus, Union Theological Seminary, New York City; Rabbi Julius Mark, Temple Emanuel, New York; and Rev. Harry Emerson Fosdick, minister emeritus, Riverside Church, New York.

A girl of deep spiritual convictions and high morals will live a good life at home the same as she will a thousand miles from it. Be assured that the greater number of young women serving our country are of high calibre.

There are chaplains to testify to the goodness of their parishioners. The one point not mentioned in your letter but should be discussed with your parents is age. You are only 17. Would there be wisdom in your working at home for one or two years; then if you were of the same feeling, begin your career in the service.

The two years in the business world would prove invaluable. It would give you time to reach an age where adjustment away from home would be an easier one.

Dear Miss Cuklin: I realize the rules of etiquette are time-tested. But there is one which is especially important. This is the one which establishes that the man orders the lady's dinner in a restaurant. A busy waitress who likes to give good service is bogged down by the relay system. 

'Fanny Hill' Said Obscene

New York. — (NC) — The New York Supreme Court has ruled that the book "Memoirs of a Woman of Pleasure," better known as "Fanny Hill," is obscene and may not be sold.

Justice Charles Marks ruled (July 24) that the book, published by G.P. Putnam's Sons, is "patently offensive and utterly without any social value."

THE COURT granted an injunction barring its sale or distribution in the state. The injunction had been sought by New York City Corporation Counsel Leo A. Larkin and the district attorneys of the five New York counties.

The book was written by John Cleland and issued in London in 1749.

Justice Marks referred to the book as "a collection of filthy and obscene stories and of a filthy and indecent character."

Paris. — (NC) — The episcopal conference of France has issued a statement expressing grave concern for the Europeans who have disappeared in Algeria.

Since Algeria became an independent country on July 3, 1962, the vast majority of the approximately one million Europeans who lived there prior to independence have left the country. Of those remaining, an unknown number have been kidnapped and held for ransom.

Their efforts were not made public to avoid giving their relatives false hopes and to keep from arousing antagonism between the French and Algerian governments.

Montreal. — (NC) — Paul-Emile Cardinal Lévesque, Archbishop of Montreal, has announced the establishment of an ecumenical center here.

The center, believed by many to be the first of its kind in North America, will be supervised by the Rev. Father Francis Beauchamp, S.J., chairman of the Archbishop's Ecumenical Commission, founded last year by Cardinal Lévesque.

It will be open to members of all religious bodies and will house a library containing books, pamphlets, and other materials of interest to all religions. It will also organize events bringing together representatives of various faiths to promote better mutual understanding. Activities will begin in the early fall.

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

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
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
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
