The award was made by Dr. Werner Von Braun, head of the United States Space Program. In making the award and presenting the citation, Dr. Von Braun spoke highly of Bartley's leading role in the Security investigations which have been accomplished.

India Nun To Graduate At Nazareth College

It won't be long now before Nazareth College establishes its first alumnae chapter in Kerala, India.

The charter member will be Sister M. Delanie Kanapilly, a member of the Order of Discalced Carmelites, who will graduate from Nazareth this Friday.

Before she plants the Nazareth banner on her native soil, however, Sister Delanie will extend her stay in the United States to pursue graduate studies at the San Francisco College for Women. Although a sociology major at Nazareth, she will be a candidate for a Master's degree in English at the San Francisco College.

SISTER DELANIE, a member of an order that staffs five high schools, several elementary schools, three orphanages and two dispensaries in India, expects to teach in one of the high schools when she returns to Kerala. She is one of three members of her order presently in the United States.

Although Sister Delanie has not traveled too extensively in the United States, she will take with her warm memories of the country and particularly of Rochester and Nazareth College.
