Five religious superiors from the Diocese of Rochester will attend the 1963 session of the Institute for Religious at College Misericordia, Dallas, Tex., Aug. 20 to 31.

This 1963 session of 'The Institute for Religious' which will open at Misericordia on Aug. 20 is a part of a three-year course in Canon Law and Ascetical Theology. Religious superiors must attend three summer sessions to complete the course.

The two-fold objective of the Institute's course of study has been explained by its director, Father Joseph F. Gallen. The course in Canon Law is designed to explain all laws of the Church that apply to congregations of Sisters; and the course in Ascetical Theology explains and systematizes the basic principles of the spiritual life.

The Institute for Religious has been held annually at College Misericordia since 1944. Its director, the Rev. Joseph F. Gallen, has also conducted the course in Canon Law during that time.

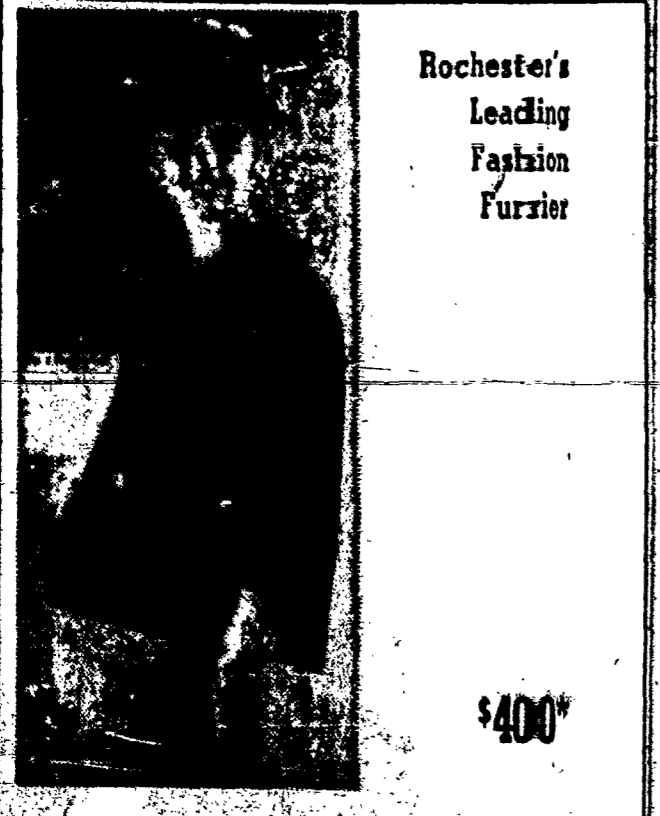
