Buffalo Club, 6 Men, 2 Girls Winners In State Track-Field Meet In Elmira

Six men's and two girls' records were shattered at the 23rd Annual New York State Track and Field Championships, in second for the Garden Town Saturday night, Aug. 10 at Parkway Field, Elmira.

The Garden Town Track Club of Buffalo walked off with its third straight State meet title with a 5-point lead over the New York Athletic Club.

Garden Town was sparked to victory by Chuckin' Chuck Gullo who established a new 100-yard dash mark of 9.6; captured the 220, and anchored the winner's 800-relay team to a new record.

Chuck's feats (or better feat) earned him the award as the meet's outstanding male performer.

Garden Town's fine showing in the 100 and 220 sparked the Buffalo runners to the title, while the NYAC stayed close with good showings in the field events.

THE WINNERS captured four of the first five places in both the 100 and 220.

In the 220 low hurdles with records shattered by Smith won the 440 and Bob Jones and Fred Greene fifth.

The NYAC took the 3/4-mile relay, after the winning Garden Town team and all others but Vestal and the NYAC were disqualified.

Other male winners were Roger Schmidt of Garden Town, who successfully defended his discus title with a toss of 142 feet 7 1/2 inches; Dick Robinson of the NYAC with a sub-par 12-2 pole-vault winning height, and Ron Daniel of the NYAC who walked the 2-mile distance in 15 minutes and 3 seconds.

Kathy Kraybill, the 69-year-old student from Rosary Hill College, Buffalo, representing Garden Town, again took honors at the meet's top female athlete.

The girls shattered two existing records and established a new mark in the 400-yard dash, an event added this year in place of the 80-yard dash.

Kathy, who is striving to run the longer distances now, won the 400 in 6:6. She finished a close second to Gladys Reynolds of the Police Athletic League of New York in the 100. Gladys' new record was 1:10.

The P.A.L. team set a new mark in the 400-yard relay at 4:9.9. The Elmira girls' team was second; Garden Town third and the Triangle Track Club of Hornell, fourth.

THE NEW YORK State Meet, held under sunny skies for the third straight year—a record in itself—was co-chaired by Matthias F. Fennell and Horace O. Phillips.

Bliss; and Elmira K of C Club earned most of its points.
