Catholic Schools Enroll 58,224

School enrollment is up, all over. When the Catholic schools of the Diocese of Rochester open on Wednesday, Sept. 4, the estimated number of children reported in the class rooms will be 47,899 in the elementary schools and 10,329 in the high schools.

The figures were given out at the diocesan school office, Rev. William M. Roche is diocesan superintendent of schools.

Several factors are present in the estimate of the school enrollment. Besides the natural growth, the adding of another school year in Bishop Kearney and Cardinal Mooney high schools are noted.

Children in the grammar schools will number 1,394 more this year. The increase in Monroe county will be 858, in other counties of the diocese 538. The high school estimate is 1,014 more in Monroe County, than last year, 217 more outside the See City area totaling 1,231 additional students.

School building reports that the \$500,000 St. Ambrose School, Empire Boulevard and Calver Road, Irondequoit is well on its way to completion. Additions are going up in Our Lady of Mercy, Greece; St. Plus X, Chili; Good Shepherd, Henrietta and St. Joseph's, Penfield.

Two other new schools, St. Lawrence School in Greece and St. John of Rochester, Penfield are expected to enroll 90 and 150 students respectively.

On the college level St. John Fisher College for men has a \$1.5 million dormitory and \$500,000 gymnasium under construction. A dormitory and faculty house to cost \$1,970,000 are being erected on Nazareth College campus.

50,000 Christians in Israel. Jerusalem, (NC)—Christians in Israel numbered 50,543, 2.3 per cent of the country's population in the 1961 census, according to the Central Bureau of Statistics, which has announced.

Melkite Rite Catholics form the largest single group, with 20,313. Greek Orthodox numbered 15,472; Latin Rite Catholics, 7,048; Maronite Rite Catholics, 2,644; and Protestants, 1,704. The remainder belong to various other Oriental Churches.

New Book Published By Fr. Charles Dolan

Rev. Charles Dolan, a native of Rochester and librarian of the University of San Diego, Calif. is the author of a new book published July 25 by the Daughters of St. Paul.

Father Dolan is a brother of the Rev. Bernard Dolan, assistant pastor of St. Francis Xavier Church, Rochester.

The volume features translations from early Christian literature about the Blessed Virgin Mary, and is titled "A Voice Said Ave!"

FATHER DOLAN'S new book is a devotional tour of the science of Mariology. It contains selected passages from the writings of the Fathers, Doctors and theologians as they turned their keen minds to describe Our Lady.

"A Voice Said Ave!" is amply illustrated with reproductions of the works of F. Nagel and contains bibliographies, footnotes and alphabetical notes. The St. Paul Edition will be available in hard-bound and paperback editions.

The U.S. Marine Corps is the subject of a bibliography also just published by Father Dolan and the library staff who gathered material on the Marines from resources available in the University at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot and the San Diego Public Library.

"Marine Corps Bibliography" is published by Sweeney Press in New York City, a publishing house which purveys scholarly books particularly for the library profession.

The bibliography contains approximately 1,000 items—listings, books, pamphlets, and magazine articles. With very few exceptions it is twentieth century material, emphasizing the years 1940-1960, and leaning heavily on the historical approach.

Interracial Council Backs Rights March. The board of directors of the Catholic Interracial Council has endorsed the coming Civil Rights March on Washington to be held Aug. 28. It was announced that this action was in response to the call by the National Catholic Conference for Interracial Justice that white Christians everywhere support the leaders of the demonstration march.

Two delegates from Rochester, including the Rev. Robert Kregel, chaplain of the local Council, participated in an emergency meeting of the National Conference in Chicago which resulted in the call for support.

The Council urges all Catholics who are able, to join in the march. Members of the Council will travel with other local organizations by chartered bus. Round trip fare is \$25 and buses will leave Tuesday evening, Aug. 27 and will return early Thursday morning.
