### Enrollment Rises In Area Schools

An increase of 5% in Elmira area parochial and high schools registration will again establish a new high mark with 3895 students entering the eight grammar school and one high next year.

St. Mary's at Horseheads will open two new classrooms of their four room addition and operating with seven grades will have 102 pupils enter for the new term.

This vastly expanded enrollment represents a 20% increase over last year.

St. Patrick's also shows an increase in registration of 20% due largely to the addition of a Kindergarten class.

Notre Dame high school reports an increase of 5% in their registration.

A total of 108 teachers will staff these schools including a Chaplain at Notre Dame High School, 72 Sisters and 34 Lay. The schools are operated by the Sisters of Mercy and the Sisters of St. Joseph.
