Mother Cabrini Circle Plans Scholarship Tea

Invitations have been sent out by the Mother Cabrini Circle for its Seventeenth Annual Scholarship Tea to be held Sunday, Sept. 22, from 3 p.m. until 6 p.m. at the Cutler Union, 550 University Ave.

This organization began in 1945 with a small group of Negro and white women. The late Harriet Schuyler's efforts were instrumental in the successful beginning of this group. The purpose of the group was to organize the Negro Catholic women into an affiliate of the Diocesan Council of the National Council of Catholic Women.

Since 1947 the group has been affiliated with the Monroe County Council, D.C.C.W. As a project for the new group, Father John Callahan, then chaplain at Our Lady of Mercy High School, suggested the Circle pay the tuition of a Negro girl at Mercy High. Thirty-nine boys and girls have been provided with Catholic high school scholarships and this year another five full scholarships will be presented.

Mother Cabrini Circle presently has a membership of 40 women who strive towards improving interracial relations, serve as a source of information and goodwill to other groups, help with neighborhood welfare work and provide these scholarships. The annual tea is held to meet the cost of scholarships.
