

New Classroom, Faculty Office Planned At Fisher

Joseph J. Meyer, chairman of the Board of Regents and Robert C. Glavin, chairman of the Planning Committee of St. John Fisher College, announced today that the college will begin construction soon on a classroom and faculty office building to be ready for use in September 1964.

The Dormitory Authority of the State of New York will finance and construct the building for the use of the college through a bond issue in which the four commercial banks of Rochester shall participate.

PROPOSALS FOR construction of the three-story building will be received in Albany on Oct. 24. Construction is expected to begin early in November and the building is scheduled for completion for September 1964.

The three-story brick, stone and steel building with approximately 65,000 square feet of floor space, will be modern in design and in harmony with the present buildings. It will contain a lecture auditorium, language laboratory, student government offices, lounge, 17 classrooms of varying size, seven seminar rooms, 18 faculty offices and a book store. Its outside dimensions are 125 feet by 220 feet.

The building will be completely air conditioned and will join the present chemistry building. It will be constructed on the lawn area between the parking lot and chemistry building.

The Very Rev. Charles J. Lavery, C.S.B., president of the college, said that construction of this building will allow a student enrollment of 1200. This year 714 students are enrolled, many, the Bishop passed in an increase of 100 over last year.

The new building will also permit renovation on the second floor of the administration building, making extra space for the library.

The new building is an element of the college's long range "master plan" which has a target date of 1970 for completion. The next phase of construction in the master plan calls for a second dormitory, a physics and biology building, and a library to be completed by 1968-69.

Presently under construction at the college is the gymnasium which will be in use in December of this year. Ward Hall, the first campus dormitory, was opened this month and houses 160 resident students.
