**Council Centers Serve Newsmen**

Vatican City—(NC)—Ten national and international news centers operated by bishops and three others sponsored by religious communities are serving the hundreds of newsmen covering the ecumenical council's second session.

A REVIEW of the facilities offered to reporters was contained in a handbook issued by the council's central document center.

The bishops news centers included the American Bishops' press panel and the German, Latin American, Brazilian, Canadian (with French and English language sections), Spanish, French, Dutch, Italian and Pan-African centers.

Religious societies with press centers are the White Friars, Oblates of Mary Immaculate and the Society of the Divine Word.

**Bp. Neumann Beatification**

Bishop Neumann, who was canonized on March 28, 1882, could never quite get used to the new office. Distinct pomp and ceremony, he was reluctant to attend social teas and the council's central document center.

In his first sermon as head of the diocese, Bishop Neumann strongly urged that all Catholic children attend Catholic schools. About six weeks after his consecration, he assembled a group of clergy and laymen to discuss setting up parish schools throughout the Philadelphia diocese. A week later the group adopted a plan for establishment of a central board of education in the diocese.

In 1853 Bishop Neumann launched the first diocesan cycle of Forty Hours Devotion in America.

**TEACHERS**

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This signal contribution of Bishop Neumann was made a subject of canon law by the Third Plenary Council of Baltimore 30 years after the bishop's death.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS soon found their enrollment decreasing, as one Catholic school after another went up in the Philadelphia diocese. To provide teachers for the growing number of students, Bishop Neumann brought into the diocese Christian Brothers, Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur, Sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, and Sisters of the Holy Cross. In April, 1855, he founded an American congregation of the Sisters of the Third Order of St. Francis, whose motherhouse now is located in Glen Riddle, Pa.

These were the cure of J. Kent Lenahan of suburban Philadelphia, who suffered a fractured skull and multiple internal injuries in an automobile accident in 1949, and the cure of Eva Benassi Pantani of Sassuolo, Italy, of acute peritonitis in 1922.

Bishop Neuman is the third U.S. citizen, and the first male one, to be beatified. Proof of his citizenship in the form of a passport certificate, dated October 13, 1854, was recently discovered in the National Archives in Washington, D.C.

The U.S. citizens already beatified are St. Francis Xavier Cabrini, a naturalized citizen beatified in 1938 and canonized as a saint in 1946, and native-born Mother Elizabeth Seton, founderess of the Sisters of Charity in the U.S. who was beatified on March 17, 1963.

On January 5, 1860, Bishop Neumann, while walking at 13th and Vine Streets in Philadelphia, fell to his knees suddenly and died shortly afterwards. He was 49.

When Pope Benedict XV declared him Venerable in 1921, he said that if some persons could not "picture him to themselves as a hero apart from grand undertakings, We hasten to say that wonderful results can spring from simple deeds, provided these are performed as perfectly as possible and with unremitting constancy."

He also said: "Venerable Neumann's activity was indeed admirable, not so much for the good he effected in the fleeting hour of the present, as for that which assured the benefit for future ages."

Some 300 parishioners have helped over the past eight years to build first a parish hall and then the church. A non-Catholic supplied an interest-free \$25,000 loan which covered almost a third of the building's total cost.

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**Council Prayer Indulgences**

Vatican City—(NC)—Special indulgences have been added to a prayer which His Holiness Pope Paul VI asked priests and religious to say for the success of the ecumenical council.

To priests and Religious who say the prayer before reciting the Divine Office or the Little Office of the Blessed Virgin, a partial indulgence of 500 days has been granted for each time prayer is recited before the office, and a plenary indulgence once a month to those who recite it daily.

THE ENGLISH translation of the prayer is:

"O Lord, God, we offer Thy Majesty this sacrifice of praise and, united in devoted obedience of mind with Thy servant our Pontiff Paul, we ask Thy great kindness, that Thou might look on the Second Vatican Ecumenical Council with generous countenance and make its outcome fruitful with an abundance of Thy grace. Through Christ Our Lord. Amen."

The usual conditions are required for the plenary indulgence: confession, Communion and prayers for the intention of the Pope.

**State KC Meet Presents Program**

A state wide meeting of the New York Council K. of C. was held over the weekend at the Commodore Hotel in Manhattan. State Deputy Edward L. Kunzinger presided and presented his 1963 program to the state chairmen, district deputies and grand knights.

At the dinner held Saturday evening in the hotel, Rev. Edward Lodge Curran, faithful friar of the Long Island General Assembly, president of the International Catholic Truth Society and pastor of St. Sebastian Church, Woodside was introduced as the principal speaker by toastmaster Matthew J. Wilson, secretary to the state deputy.

Father Curran highlighted the evening by a speech on Americanism, emphasizing that the members of the K. of C. are outstanding examples of true Americans by showing their loyalty for both God and country. Education, youth and charity programs were elaborated upon in addition to the extension of membership in the State of New York. Father Curran concluded his speech by asking for God's blessing upon the members of the order.

**Haile Selassie Given Doctorate**

Washington—Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia was awarded an honorary doctorate of laws by Georgetown University during the ruler's visit to the nation's capital.

In a private ceremony, Father Lucien Matte, S.J., president of the University of St. Mary's, conferred the degree on the emperor. The ceremony was held in the late 1940s to build up a system of higher education.

**Church-Builders Carry in Altar**

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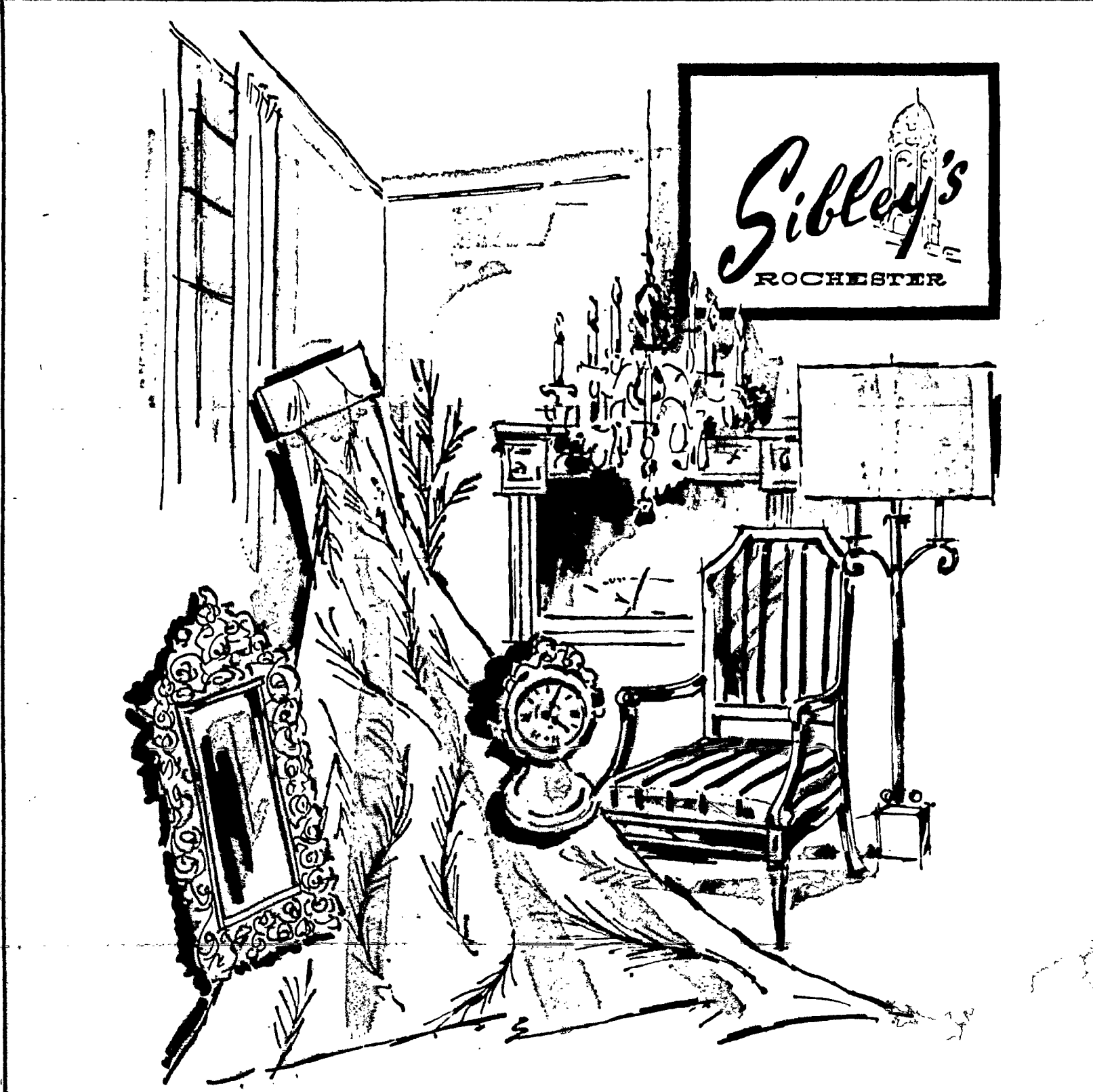
