Council Prayer Indulgences

VATICAN CITY—(NC)—Special indulgences have been added to a prayer which His Holiness Pope Paul VI asked priests and Religious to say for the success of the ecumenical council.

To priests and Religious who say the prayer before reciting the Divine Office or the Little Office of the Blessed Virgin a partial indulgence of 500 days has been granted for each time the prayer is recited before the office, and a plenary indulgence once a month to those who recite it daily.

THE ENGLISH translation of the prayer is:

"O Lord, God, we offer Thy Majesty this sacrifice of praise and, united in devoted obedience of mind with Thy servant our Pontiff Paul, we ask Thy great kindness that Thou might look on the Second Vatican Ecumenical Council with generous countenance and make its outcome fruitful with an abundance of Thy grace. Through Christ Our Lord. Amen."

The usual conditions are required for the plenary indulgence: confession, Communion and prayers for the intention of the Pope.

State KC Meet Presents Program

A state wide meeting of the New York Council K. of C. was held over the weekend at the Commodore Hotel in Manhattan.

State Deputy Edward L. Kunzinger presided and presented his 1964 program to the state chairmen, district deputies and grand knights.

At the dinner held Saturday evening in the hotel, Rev. Edward Curran highlighted the evening by a speech on Americanism, emphasizing that the members of the K. of C. are outstanding examples of true Americans by showing their loyalty for Both God and country. Education, youth and charity programs were elaborated upon in addition to the extension of membership in the State of New York. Father Curran concluded his speech by asking for God's blessing upon the members of the order.

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Council Centers Serve Newsmen

Vatican City—(NC)—Ten national and international news centers operated by bishops and three others sponsored by religious communities are serving the hundreds of newsmen covering the ecumenical council.

Bishop Neumann, who was consecrated on March 28, 1852, could never quite get used to his new office. Blushing piously and ceremoniously, he was reduced to wearing the fashions of clerical clothes he was used to.

The bishopric news centers included the American Bishop press band, and the German Latin American, Brazilian, Canadian (with French and English-language sections), Spanish, French, Dutch, Italian and Portuguese centers.

Religious societies with press centers are the White Friars Oblates of Mary Immaculate and the Society of the Divine Word.

Church-Builders Carry In Altar

Sonning Common, England—(NC)—Parishioners who helped build their church here carried the altar into the church in procession when it was opened (Sept. 29).

OTHERS CARRIED in the baglioni font, altar stone, altar basin, tabernacle and candlesticks.

Some 300 parishioners have helped over the past eight years to build a parish hall and the church. A non-Catholic supplied an interest-free \$15,000 loan which covered almost a third of the building's total cost.

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These were the cure of J. Kent Lehman of suburban Philadelphia, who suffered a fractured skull and multiple internal injuries in an automobile accident in 1949, and the cure of Eva Boissai Pantani of Sasuola, Italy, of acute peritonitis in 1922.

Bishop Neuman is the third U.S. citizen, and the first male one, to be beatified. Proof of his citizenship in the form of a passport certificate, dated October 13, 1854, was recently discovered in the National Archives in Washington, D.C.

The U.S. citizens already beatified are St. Frances Xavier Cabrini, a naturalized citizen beatified in 1938 and canonized as a saint in 1946, and native-born Mother Elizabeth Seton, foundress of the Sisters of Charity in the U.S. who was beatified on March 17, 1963.

On January 3, 1860, Bishop Neuman, while walking at 13th and Vine Streets in Philadelphia, fell to his knees suddenly and died shortly
