

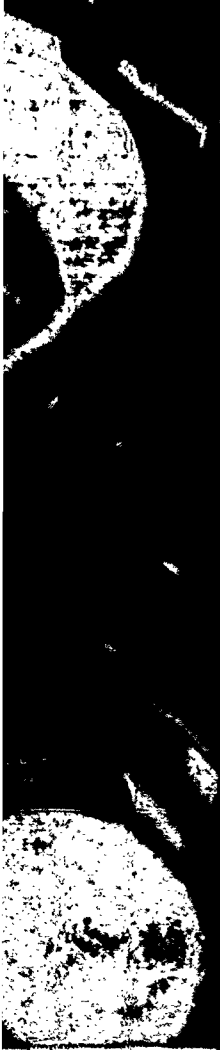

Fisher Faculty Promotions

Five faculty promotions were announced today at St. John Fisher College by Very Rev. Charles J. Laverty, C.S.B., president.

Mr. John R. Cavanaugh, C.S.B., was promoted from assistant professor of English to associate professor. He is a native of Rochester who was appointed as instructor in English at St. John Fisher College in 1938. He received his B.A. and his M.A. degrees from the University of Rochester in 1938 and his M.A. degree from the University of the Modern Language Association of America in 1940. Mr. Cavanaugh is also director of the resident students at St. John Fisher College campus.

Charles F. Wolfe, a native of Rochester who lives at 502 Goodwin Street, South, was promoted from assistant professor of accounting to associate professor. Wolfe is a certified public accountant who received his B.A. degree from St. Bernard's Seminary in Rochester in 1932 and his M.S. degree in accounting from the University of Rochester in 1934. Before joining St. John Fisher College in 1941, he taught accounting at the University of Rochester on a part-time basis, served as a junior accountant at Glen O. Williams & Co., as senior accountant at Williams, Clapp & Co., and as in-charge accountant at Haskins & Sells, certified public accountants for three years. He is a member of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, the New York State Society of Certified Public Accountants, the American Accounting Association, the National Association of Accountants and Phi Beta Kappa.

THREE INSTRUCTORS were appointed assistant professors. Mrs. Olga T. Dwyer, a native of Rochester who has two children and lives at 348 Park Street, was promoted from instructor to assistant professor of modern language. She received her B.A. degree in English from the University of Rochester in 1933, her M.A. degree in Spanish from the U. of R. in 1937, and has done additional graduate work at the University of Rochester, University School and Columbia University. Before joining St. John Fisher College in 1942, she taught modern languages at East High School and was employed by Busch & Lomb Optical Company and the College of Columbia University. She has had a number of articles published on modern languages and is a member of Phi Sigma Iota, national language honorary society.

Mrs. M. Teresa Harvey, 48 College Run, Pittsford, was promoted from instructor to assistant professor of English. Born in Jersey City, N.J., she is married and has four children. Before joining St. John Fisher College in 1942, she taught at the College of Mt. St. Vincent, New York in 1942 and her M.A. degree from Catholic Univer-

sity, Washington, D.C. She has B.A. degree in Spanish and continued graduate work at the Italian from the University of Rochester. Sister Thomas Harrison, professor of English at Nazareth College, will address the English teachers on the subject, "English and the College Freshman." Sister M. Emille, also of Nazareth College faculty, has just completed a year of graduate study at the University of Dijon, France. Sister will present to the foreign language teachers: "Highlights of a Year Abroad." Sister will use slides depicting scenes from her travels in France, England, Italy, and Greece.

A panel representing high school teachers of mathematics from the Rochester area will explain local Experiments in Mathematics. Panel members are Sister Anne Holme, Nazareth Academy; Sister Anne Kauter, St. Agnes High School, and Sister M. Bernita, Mount Carmel High School, Auburn.

SOCIETY STUDIES will hear Doctor Don Hart, associate professor of anthropology at Syracuse University. Dr. Hart's illustrated lecture will be on the subject, "Southeast Asia: Crossroads of the World."

Fisher College Registrations Increase
The student registration at St. John Fisher College for the 1963-64 scholastic year stands at 712, compared to 620 students last year — an increase of more than 15 percent. Rev. Joseph E. Dorsey, C.S.B., dean of the college, announced these figures today. He said that student enrollment has increased seven times since the first class of 110 students entered in 1951.

This record student enrollment includes the largest freshman class in St. John Fisher history—265 men including, for the first time, 110 resident students living in the new dormitory, Ward Hall.

The rest of the student body is made up of 172 sophomores, 159 juniors, and 103 seniors, and eight special students.

In his announcement, Father Dorsey noted that the student body is "largely from the Rochester area, but students at St. John Fisher College represent this fall
