

St. Mary's Parish, Bath Drive Kick-off Slated

Rev. William M. Roche, Superintendent of Schools for the Rochester Diocese, will be the principal speaker at the general committee kick-off in the \$20,000 minimum goal campaign of St. Mary's Church, Bath, according to an announcement of the pastor Rev. John P. O'Malley. The dinner meeting of the 166-man committee is slated for 6:30 p.m. this Saturday evening in the parish hall.

CAMPAGNERS ARE seeking funds to complete the parish school by the addition of a second story to include three classrooms, library and an audio-visual room. The original structure was started on July 17, 1961 at a cost of \$183,000. Auxiliary Bishop Casey of the Catholic Diocese of Rochester dedicated the new school on May 26, 1961 and the first classes comprising the kindergarten and two grades were enrolled the following September. Currently, there are 41 elementary grades and kindergarten. With the completion of the present program there will be a full complement of eight grades and an anticipated enrollment in excess of 400 pupils.

Climax in the five-week campaign will be reached next Sunday, Nov. 3, when the volunteer workers will call on fellow parishioners in their homes between 2 and 4 p.m. to obtain two-year pledges to the drive. Committeemen will gather in the church at 120 p.m. for Benediction before embarking on their parish-wide canvass.

On Sunday afternoon, Oct. 27, advance solicitation committee men under the leadership of William J. Dulont sought pledges from hundreds of parishioners with results which the pastor termed "most gratifying, although tabulation is as yet incomplete. Assisting in this phase of the drive, as group leaders, are Guy S. Caspary, Thomas R. Connelly, Bernard J. Fagan and John J. Shields. Others taking part were William Boyle, James M. Fagan, Robert G. Gagnon, Donald A. Hand, Henry Kulkowski, Francis A. Lyster, Dr. Michael Magpano, Brandon McDonnell, Dr. Harold Nadler, Eugene O'Malley, Richard Perry, Charles E. Rice, Robert N. Dr. Ernest P. Smith headed the general committee and spoke again to the group following this Mass. In the evening the C.Y.A. members will meet in their respective parish churches for the Feast of Our Lady, the C.Y.A. Act of Dedication, and Benediction.

On Sunday, Nov. 3, the teenagers will assist at Mass in the parish and receive Communion together in their respective parishes. At 2 p.m. they will be shown the movie, *Song of Bernadette*, in St. Mary's gym. The retreat will come to a close with the regular C.Y.A. Holy Hour Program and a special Act of Reparation to the Sacred Heart of Jesus and Benediction.

All C.Y.A. members are urged to register for the retreat and to obtain the tickets which will admit them to all the activities, securing them from their respective promoters. The final day for registration is Wednesday, Oct. 30.

Prizes will be awarded in three categories: best, most original, and funniest costumes. The prize will be \$3 at the door.

National CWV Head Denounces Tito Visit

Two weeks ago the leading nation in the free world played host to Marshall Tito, Communist Dictator of Yugoslavia. A man who by his very existence is a sworn enemy of democracy and the American way of life.

In Rochester on Oct. 24, National Commander of the Catholic War Veterans Walter D. Hyle Jr. of Baltimore, Md., issued an explanation for the *Courier Journal's* refusal to publish an advertisement for the visit to visit is fully justified. Hyle said that the Catholic War Veterans must be disabled in service. Veterans of Foreign Wars must have served overseas.

Each has a record for service and therefore must have the right to be in the ranks of the organization. Hyle said that the American Legion (Veteran status), Disabled American Veterans (must be disabled in service), Veterans of Foreign Wars (must have served overseas).

When put to a question by the *Courier Journal* regarding the matter, Hyle said: "I am a Communist and I am against it happening again. Tito is a Communist and he has sworn to wipe out Democracy and to wipe out the American way of life."

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New Our Lady of Lourdes Church, Rochester

Building fund campaign for new Our Lady of Lourdes Church, Brighton, at Rhinecliff, Imperial and Varina Drives will conclude Sunday, Nov. 3 with three-hour solicitation of parishioners for \$150,000. Church will measure approximately 70 feet wide by 140 feet long and 28 feet high at highest point of roof. It will seat about 600. Exterior will be predominantly of stone with decorative metal panels.

Father Dunn pointed to the importance of the laity to the church and explained the significance of Catholic Mothers' Councils, pre-cana and campus groups, and how these organizations have developed into national and international organizations. He noted that the Christian Family Movement is one of these organizations, designed for married couples to promote happy family life.

Newman Clubs Confer State Session Mapped Here

Utica College was the scene of the annual fall meeting of the Empire State Province of Newman Clubs, Oct. 25-27. In previous years these meetings have been held in various locations. This year the trend has now been changed to educational conferences, beginning this fall.

An educational conference stresses a wider effort of the Newman movement that did the leadership conference. The latter had been mainly concerned with the work of the Newman movement on the local campus. The new stress lies in the spreading of mission work off-campus as well as on it to get a wider spreading of faith.

This fall's conference stressed the theme of the "campus mission," that is, how an individual college campus can spread the faith to the less fortunate peoples of the world.
