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Radio Rosary Marks 5,000th Broadcast



This Sunday, Nov. 10, the Radio Rosary for Peace will begin its 5,000th broadcast over the airwaves of Station WSAY in Rochester. It may well be a national record in uninterrupted nightly broadcasting of the Rosary.

Bishop Kearney led the Rosary on the opening night — March 4, 1950.

This first program fulfilled a long-time dream of Father Joseph Cirincione, pastor of St. Francis of

Assisi Church. The idea of thousands of voices rising nightly in prayer came to him while on a pilgrimage to the Shrine of Our Lady of the Rosary in Fatima, Portugal.

With the support of the Bishop, who has been president of the movement since its inception, the Radio Rosary for Peace has become a diocesan institution. The pioneer committee included Mr. Frank Wolfe, the late Mr. Joseph Benn and Father Richard

Torney, now Catholic chaplain of Cornell University.

Supported by volunteer contributions, the Radio Rosary is now broadcast from St. Francis of Assisi Parish Center or from the church. In the summer months, it has become customary to broadcast outdoors from the Rosary Shrine on the parish grounds.

Father Cirincione estimates that 170 million Rosaries have been recited during the program in its thirteen years, with a nightly audience of 30,000 lis-

teners. Bishop Kearney is still a frequent Rosary leader, especially on feasts of the Blessed Virgin.

Letters have been received at the Rosary Center from throughout the Diocese as well as Pennsylvania and Canada.

To the credit of its founders, the Radio Rosary for Peace program finds thousands of families in the Rochester Diocese on their knees each evening in what has become an inspiring tradition of unity.



College Students Hear of 'Renewal'

The Liturgical Weekend for college students on "The Renewal of the Whole Church" at Nazareth College from November 1-3 drew participants from New York, Pennsylvania, and Ohio.

Over two hundred and fifty students, religious, and clergy were in attendance on Friday and Saturday with over three hundred attending Sunday's session.

According to Patricia Lawlor, chairman of the student committee which assisted the Nazareth theology department in planning this event, the following colleges were represented: Rosary Hill, D'Youville, Monroe Community, Keuka, Mercyhurst, Maria Regina, Brockport, St. John Fisher, Western Reserve, Ursula Candler, St. Bonaventure Community, Nazareth, Holyoke, St. Mary's School of Nursing, and Saint Andrew's Seminary.

Rev. John F. Madden, C.S.B., chairman of the English Department, St. Michael's College, University of Toronto, opened the weekend with a talk on "The Renewal of the Church."

He said the Church is dynamic because it possesses Christ's own life and continues His saving actions in time. Father Madden then explained how the present form of worship evolved.

HISTORY SHOWS that certain dangers or errors in doctrine arose which necessitated correction or precautionary measures on the part of the Church. In an attempt to stress a particular aspect of worship, often a related one received less emphasis than it deserved. As an example, Father Madden mentioned the tendency to stress the "ex opere operato" efficacy of sacraments while failing to stress the importance of the receiver's dispositions. Present liturgical reforms seek to restore the proper balance between both factors, he said.

In contrast to the defensive posture of the time of the Council of Trent, we now have the desire "to find the truth wherever it is" according to Father Madden.

MAIN SPEAKERS for the weekend were Rev. Gerard S. Sloan, chairman of the Department of Religious Education at the Catholic University of America and President of the National Liturgical Conference. His first talk, Saturday evening, was on "The Mystery of the Church." Father Sloan said in considering the Church, people are often struck by the incoherence of its glorified aspect in

Robert McPiggins, Tompkins and Tioga counties, Rev. James O'Connell, Ontario, Seneca, and Yates counties, Rev. William J. Gaynor, Wayne county, Rev. William M. Thomas, Corning, Rev. William H. Hickey, Steuben county, and Rev. John L. Coonan, Livingston county.

These directors, who serve also as deanery moderators of the Rochester Diocesan Council of Catholic Women which Bishop Kearney has entrusted with the promotion of the clothing collection, will supervise the campaign in their localities.

Last year 341 parishes of the diocese contributed 63,854 pounds of usable clothing to the nationwide total of 17,842,000 pounds of clothing, shoes, blankets, and other materials, valued at \$25,000,000.
