

Aquinas, McQuaid Set For Gridiron Tilts

The varsity football program of Aquinas and McQuaid will become a reality next season.

McQuaid's rector, the Rev. Robert F. Grewen, S.J., announced yesterday that he had signed a two-year contract with Aquinas. With the first game set for the Sunday afternoon of Oct. 27, 1964. Both games will be played at Aquinas Memorial Stadium, which can accommodate up to 23,000 spectators. Proceeds of the games will be shared equally between the two schools.

FATHER GREWEN, obviously pleased at the outcome of his meeting with Aquinas principal, Rev. Fergus J. Sheehy, C.S.B., and Aquinas athletic moderator, Rev. Cyril F. Carter, C.S.B., expressed complete satisfaction with the arrangements. "They have been very helpful with all the ins and outs of this thing," said the rector, who has become McQuaid's number one fan since coming to the school last January.

Athletic competition between the two schools is nothing new. Their basketball games at the War Memorial are becoming semi-annual fixtures in the local sports scene, and they've been going at it in baseball, track, swimming, cross-country, and tennis for as long as four years. It was only last year, however, that football joined the list.

and then only on a freshman and junior varsity level.

It's been a long while since Aquinas has met a local foe on the gridiron. According to the Dewey Ave. archives, it was back in 1949 that the Little Irish defeated Madison, 29-7. Since then, it's been largely inter-sectional rivalries that have linked the Aquinas schedule. Pennsylvania and Ohio teams predominated.

Next year's game will be a kind of reunion for a couple of Boston College grads—McQuaid's head coach Tom Seymour and Aquinas' boss man Joe Repko. And it will be a special kind of return to Aquinas Stadium for Seymour's assistant, Frank Nove, who was an outstanding end on the Aquinas team that christened the stadium before a crowd of 22,500 back in 1949.

BOTH TEAMS will be drawing heavily on new blood when the much-anticipated meeting finally takes place. Aquinas boasts 28 seniors and McQuaid 16 from the squad that compiled 44 and 2-3 records respectively this season. Those departures will leave the Little Irish only end Randy Block as a returning starter. McQuaid will see a bit better off, having quarterback Dick Delaguarda, halfbacks Dan Weisman and Mike Spiegel, and linemen Jim Compagno and Dennis Pilato as well-seasoned hands.

This year's junior varsity records provide some puzzling fodder for the fans who might have bet on the gridiron wagon. Aquinas had one of its poorest J.V. campaigns, with a 1-6 record, while McQuaid was 4-2-1, including a 25-7 win over the Little Irish. Yet when those same teams met as freshmen, the score was 41-7 in Aquinas' favor. And that season, the Aquinas freshman outburst.

So much for statistics. Coach Seymour and Repko will fret about them come next August.
