**Paperback On Social Teaching**  
Milwaukee—(NC)—The Social Teaching of Pope John XXIII, a paperback book by Father John F. Cronin, S.S., has been published by Bruce Publishing Company here. The book is a commentary on Pagan in Tertio and Mater et Magistra. Father Cronin is assistant director of the Social Action Department, National Catholic Welfare Conference.

**City Native Priest Dies In Michigan**  
The Pontifical Mass for Father Marvin was celebrated in Our Lady of Lake Huron Church of which he was pastor for 25 years. The Michigan pastor, 72, died in St. Joseph's Hospital, Ann Arbor, Mich. Nov. 10, 1964. Educated in St. Andrew's and St. Bernard seminaries, Rochester, he was ordained to the priesthood in 1916. Surviving are two brothers, Edmund H. of Macdon, N.Y., and John of Adrian, Mich.; two sisters, Mrs. Frank McCabe of Bangor, Mich., and Sister Madeline Mary O.P. of Chicago; and other nephews and nieces. Burial was in Adrian, Mich. on Nov. 14.

**Canadian Indians Content With Reservation Life**  
Toronto—(NC)—A senator asserted here that one of Canada's most long-standing and baffling problems concerns Canadian Indians. Sen. David A. Croll told members of the Catholic Council of Canada at their first biennial meeting (Oct. 10) that the problem is unlike the situation regarding Negroes of South Africa and the United States. "The colored peoples in these countries," he said, "are on the march, and their struggle for freedom and equality of opportunity seems destined to be crowned with success, because of the drive and determination impelling these minorities to demand nothing less than justice for themselves and their children." But the Indians in Canada are far from "on the march," he said. The senator added it is regrettable that "our indifference and apathy are unlikely to be removed by any drive or pressure on the part of the Indians themselves." Croll said most Canadian Indians today are "herded into reservations" under tutelage and control of Indian agents. Many don't want a release from this system, even though it amounts to "apartheid" in its almost classical form, he said. "Many Canadians think in terms of wipe out — abolish — eradicate the reservations. The references is that they are a national stigma — ghetto — compound — blot on our education — blot on our conscience. Their lot is squalor — poverty and hunger. They live in sub-standard homes, are paid sub-standard wages, enjoy sub-standard health, and are treated with sub-standard decency," the senator said. Canadians would welcome the entry of Indians into the mainstream of Canadian consciousness and life, the senator said. "We need to take them gently but firmly by the hand and lead them into the 20th century to join the Canadian stream of life."

**25 Years Ago**

Bishop Kearney sounded a call throughout the diocese for cooperation in helping people to get back to work. He issued the call with a strong plea for "a spirit of confidence," and "the courage to keep business in our community" stirring. Fully aware of the importance of current happenings in the world, the Rochester Diocesan Council of Catholic Women in eighth annual convention adopted a resolution denouncing "exaggerated nationalism and the theory of racial superiority." "In your hands may be the future salvation of the nation," Monsignor Fulton J. Sheen told delegates to the regional conference of National Laymen's Retreat League in Seneca Hotel. Bishop Kearney at opening Pontifical Mass said "if men are to accomplish personal sanctification... it will come first from such practices as retreats."

**He's Not Very Ecumenical**  
Manchester—(NC)—New Hampshire Protestant minister here protested use of a public school for evening Catholic religious classes. Rev. William D. Goble, pastor, First Baptist Church, based his protest to the Manchester School Board on United States Supreme Court decisions in 1948 and 1952. He did not specifically name the Catholic church using Memorial High School classrooms but school superintendent John T. McDonald said the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine of Our Lady of Perpetual Help parish is authorized to use the school. McDonald said use of public schools for religious purposes after school hours is permissible under New Hampshire law.

**Georgetown Honors Jurist**  
Washington—(RNS)—Chief Justice Earl Warren received an honorary Doctor of Laws degree here at Georgetown University's special 175th anniversary convocation. In his convocation discourse the chief justice expressed concern particularly over the problems of race which exist in the nation. "We must discover the way to make meaningful in every respect the great principles symbolized in the words 'all men are created equal' and 'equal protection of laws,'" he said. "A materialist world has faced us with the challenge to rediscover through the Good Book the real meaning of 'the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man' in the light of present-day conditions."
