

\$20,000 Pledged To Mercy Hospital

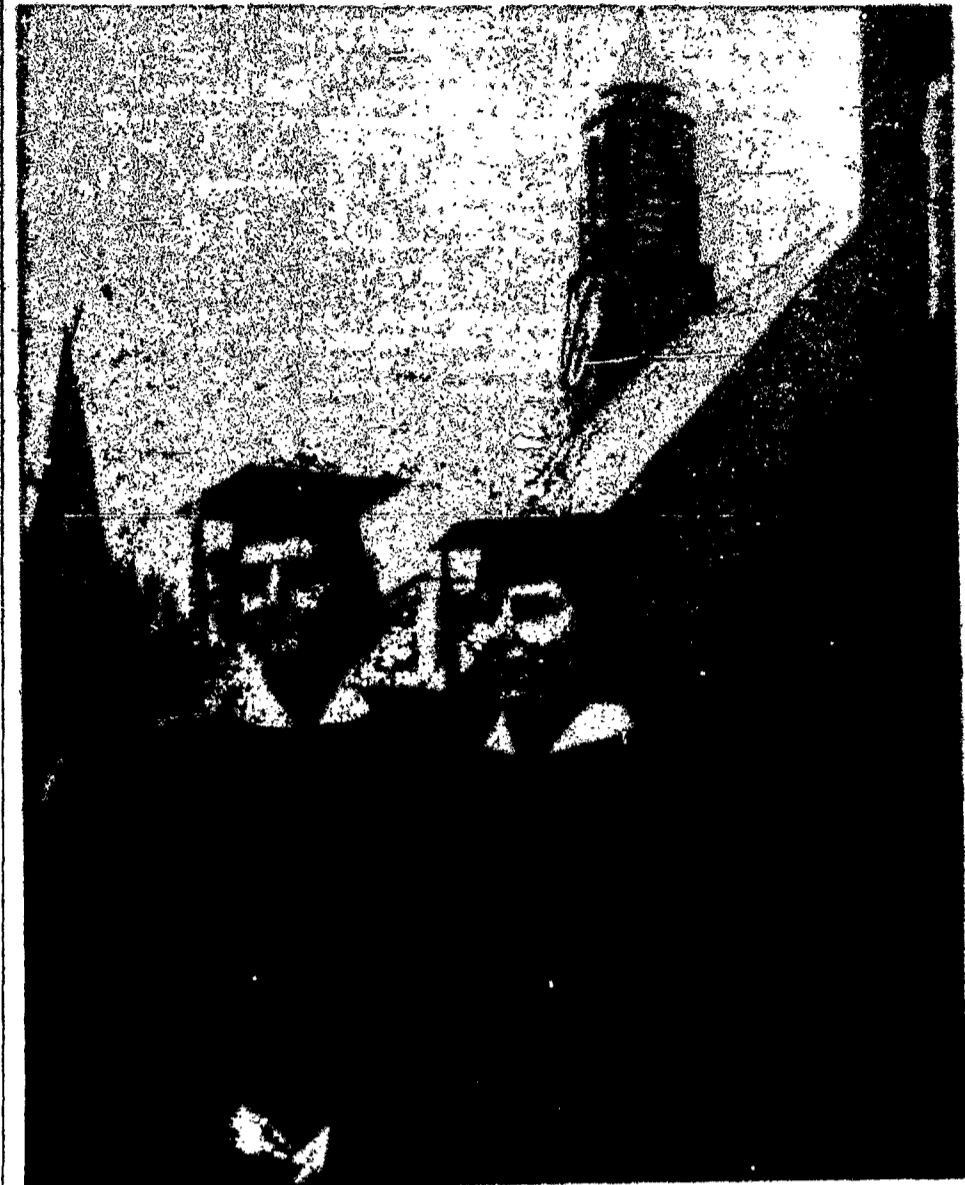

Bishop Kearney speaking at the Inter-Faith Mass Meeting in Convention Hall decried the "wild orgy of religious persecution which had reached a climax in the latest Nazi acts against Jews in Germany and told the 3000 persons present he vigorously protested all religious persecution.

Given the approbation of Bishop Walter A. Foley, the Nocturnal Adoration Society was formed in Syracuse diocese with the cooperation of Charles A. Tupper, president of Rochester Laymen's Retreat League and active in establishing the Society throughout this diocese and in the Buffalo diocese.

St. Philip Neri Plans Drive, First Convent

Parishioners of St. Philip Neri Church, Rochester, have begun a campaign to increase weekly parish revenues by at least \$800, according to an announcement of the pastor, the Rev. George J. Weinmann.
