A memorial Mass and Communion-Breakfast will be attended by members of Elmira Council and Fourth Degree Assembly Knights of Columbus on Sunday, Dec. 1.

Knights will participate in the 8 a.m. Mass in the Dunn Memorial Chapel at St. Joseph's Hospital where they will receive Holy Communion. Following Mass, a memorial service will be conducted in memory of Knights who have died during the past year, as well as for all deceased members of the Elmira Council.

The Rev. John D. Hurley, a priest of our diocese, who is home on a visit from the Philippine Islands, will be the principal speaker at the Communion-Breakfast.

FATHER HURLEY, a native of St. James' parish, Waverly, attended the schools in Waverly, St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's seminaries. Upon ordination in June 1957, Father served as assistant pastor in Holy Rosary parish, Rochester; St. John's parish, Spencerport, and Our Lady of Lourdes in Elmira.

In 1958 Father Hurley entered the U.S. Air Force to serve as chaplain. Among other assignments in the Chaplain's Corps, Father served in the Philippine Islands. In 1957 upon discharge from active service, Father Hurley requested Bishop

Bishop Kearney speaking at the Inter-Faith Meeting in Convention Hall declared the "Bible is the only common religion which had reached a climax" in the latest Nazi acts against Jews in Germany and told the 3000 persons present he vigorously protested all religious persecution.

Given the approbation of Bishop Walter A. Foery, the Nocturnal Adoration Society was formed in Syracuse diocese with the cooperation of Charles A. Tucker, president of Rochester Laymen's Retreat League and active in establishing the Society throughout this diocese and in the Buffalo diocese.

That this occasion would effect "A deeper love for Christ in the Blessed Sacrament" was the wish expressed by Archbishop Thomas F. Hickey at the Golden Jubilee Mass of Corpus Christi Church. The Mass was celebrated by Bishop Kearney.

Brazil Missioner Speaks To Waverly Rosarians

Waverly — Rev. Vincent Crotty, a native of Sayre, Pa., who has been serving with the Redemptorist Order in Brazil since 1951, was the guest speaker at the recent meeting of the Altar and Rosary Society of St. James Church in Waverly.
