**All-City at Notre Dame**

Notre Dame had its best season ever at the meeting with a 7-1 record. After being defeated (24-19) by Southside, the Craty Crusaders went on to defeat Athens, Hornell, both Corning East and West, Elmira Free Academy, Batavia and previously unbeaten Sayre.

Mike Johnston, N.D.'s field general, was elected to the Elmira All-City team for 1963 along with star teammates Ron (Lemmon), Bill Knott and Mike Malone.

Knott caught 30 passes for 675 yards and 6 touchdowns. He was named as an All-City End because of his shrewd change-ment running and his average gain of 10.5 yards per carry. Not only was Knott a leading ground gaining but was a defensive star, blocking three punts and making many tackles.

RON LEMONCELLI was leader in ground gained among local backs. He ran 735 yards in 123 carries averaging 6 yards per carry. Because of his speed and fleet-footedness Ron was able to outmaneuver defensive tackle "Lemon" was also a line tacker and shifty punt returner.

Mike Johnston was one of the best passers in the area gaining 787 yards for nine touchdowns. Johnston's sparkling aerial attack was outstanding for high school ball as he completed 53 per cent of his passes. Johnston ran the playbook exceptionally well for a boy his size and was also a plucky tacker.

Mike Malone, only a junior, was a key blocker for the Crusaders. As a tackling ace and speedy red dogger Malone proved invaluable on the N.D. line. His power makes him one of the best two-way linemen in the area.

On the All-City 2nd Team Joe

Brewer earned a hit for his rough and tough play at the tackle position. Dan Gine, who did a magnificent job at end for his team, was named as a second team guard. Cicotti, and Lou Holleran.
