

7th Annual Spelling Bee At McQuaid

Two scholarships with a total value of \$1800 will be the target of over 50 eighth-graders this Sunday afternoon, Dec. 8, when the Seventh Annual McQuaid Spelling Bee will be held in the school gymnasium beginning at 2 p.m.

Winner of the bee, which is open to all diocesan grammar schools, will receive a full scholarship to McQuaid valued at \$1200, while the runner-up will receive a \$600 grant. Both boys will also be awarded engraved trophies for their schools.

MEDALS WILL go to the next five finishers, and every participant will receive a certificate of spelling excellence.

Last year's winners, now freshmen at McQuaid, were William Cooke of Our Lady of Perpetual Help School and Christopher Fasano of St. Pius X School.

The board of judges for the event will be: Miss Mary A. Sheehan, Consultant to the president of St. John Fisher College; Mr. Clarence A. Amann, English instructor at St. John Fisher College and a former faculty member at McQuaid; and Mr. John P. Desautels, Jr., a Rochester attorney. Mrs. Anna Keefe, head of drama at Sacred Heart Academy, will be the announcer.

Rev. William M. Roche, diocesan superintendent of schools, will preside.

Grade School Teachers Discuss Art Instruction

Sisters and teachers from sixteen Catholic elementary schools in the Rochester diocese participated in a Christmas art workshop held at St. Helen's elementary school on Tuesday afternoon, Dec. 3.

Sister Mary Estelle, R.S.M., art instructor at Cardinal Mooney High School, conducted the program for teachers of the fifth to the eighth grades.

The fact that the ingenuity and originality of the individual child must be respected by the teacher was stressed. Exhibits of fifth to eighth grade art projects included murals, chalk drawings, crayon etchings, mobiles and Christmas decorations. It was emphasized that the child's creativeness should dictate the subject matter.

Sister Marie Martin, S.S.J., teacher of arts and crafts at the School of the Holy Child, presented art techniques to the teachers of the first to the fourth grades.

THE IMPORTANCE of developing the young child's creativity in art was discussed. Methods of making paper cutouts of scenes and designs, and three-dimensional figures were illustrated. Simple materials including colored construction paper, aluminum foil, crayons, paper boxes and cotton were utilized to produce artistic figures possible for the children to make in school.

Sisters from the three teaching communities of religious women in the Diocese of Rochester, Sisters of St. Joseph, Sisters of Mercy and School Sisters of Notre Dame, plus the lay faculties from all of their schools, were present.

Faculty meetings are scheduled each month at different schools where the Sisters and the lay teachers convene for a mutual exchange of educational techniques in all fields. This inter-Community organization has been promoted by the Sisters as an effort to attain the highest degree of excellence in teaching in the Catholic elementary schools.

Discordant Note in U.S.

San Antonio — (RNS) — Charges here by a Scottish Baptist evangelist that Americans put politics before their religion and committed a "tragic blunder" in electing a Catholic President drew sharp rebuttal from two Southern Baptist leaders.

Dr. J. Sidlow Baxter, 60, of Edinburgh, stirred the annual sessions of the Baptist General Convention of Texas with an exhortation: "Don't vote Republican... don't vote Democratic... vote Protestant."

The evangelist declared that his "heart is heavy for America today" and said President Kennedy was elected by "black Republican votes... ne'er-do-wells who always want something for nothing... millions of you dear, well-meaning Texas Baptists who wouldn't vote for Mr. Nixon because he was Republican."

He said that if in some future election "you ever have two Roman Catholics running for the presidency, I don't think you will ever be Protestant again."
