

Catholic Edition Of RSV Bible

Philadelphia — (RNS) — A Roman Catholic edition of the Protestant Revised Standard Version of the Bible will be published in Great Britain next year, it was announced here. Dr. Luther A. Weigle, dean emeritus of Yale Divinity School, who headed the 22-year project of translating and publishing the RSV, made the announcement at a session of the National Council of Churches' Division of Christian Education assembly, held in conjunction with the NCC's triennial General Assembly.

He said the special edition to be published by Thomas Nelson and Sons, Edinburgh, Scotland, "is sponsored by the Catholic Biblical Association of Great Britain and will bear the imprimatur of approval by Catholic authorities."

"The Bible is coming to be as it should be, a bond of Christian unity rather than an instrument of division," he said. "And I rejoice that the Revised Standard Version has an effective part in the movement toward fuller realization of our oneness in Jesus Christ..."

Intended for the use of British Catholics, Dr. Weigle said the version will employ some British spellings and word usage. "Catholic usage is followed in placing the Deuterocanonical books (most of the Apocryphal where they appear in the Old Testament of the Vulgate)," he said. "In the New Testament a few readings of the Vulgate are used, certain footnotes added, and a few minor alterations made in the English rendering, all in the interest of Catholic usage."

He said no list of the changes will be made public before publication of the New Testament, in the next six months, or publication of the complete Bible by the end of 1964.

The RSV was first published 11 years ago by Thomas Nelson and Sons of New York. The NCC Division of Christian Education holds the copyright. Dr. Weigle, head of the division's Standard Bible Committee, served as chairman of a 32-

Polish Prelate on Council Gains in Slow Pace

Vatican City — (RNS) — Stefan Cardinal Wyszyński, Primate of Poland, asserted here that the results of the Second Vatican Council's second session may not be as tangible as expected, but that there have been "achievements of great importance" in the life of the Church.

In a special program beamed to Poland over the Vatican Radio, the cardinal noted that the Council session had closed with votes confirming a constitution reforming the Church liturgy and a decree on the media of communications.

"Perhaps these are not very great achievements, perhaps not as great as intended or expected," he said. "But these are achievements of very great importance for the further life

and development of the Holy Mother Church."

Discussing the slow nature of the Council, Cardinal Wyszyński said this had freed the past session from excessive expectations and hopes.

"There has been around work of the Council less of the excitement which today's press is capable of creating," he commented.

"The Council has been conducted not as a parliament of odds, but rather as a team of mature intellectuals supported by prayers from the whole Catholic world, the prelate said.

"Perhaps it was felt more during the last session that the Council was a friendly meeting of men conscious of the Holy Ghost's intercession," he added. "Rather than clashes and de-

bates, Cardinal Wyszyński said, there had been "positive explications" or differing views by the Council Fathers.

"The Council preserved a deep respect for varying views and inspirations," he declared. "These views were expressed with enormous freedom and frankness in conviction" and were received in an atmosphere of "Christian freedom and mutual loyalty."

"It can be said there were virtually no restrictions on views expressed, even though time was pressing," the cardinal said.

The world now thinks of the Council in less sensational terms, the cardinal said, and "this is perhaps the greatest achievement of the conciliar date."

Agreement Reached At Famed Shrine

Jerusalem — (RNS) — An agreement was signed here between the Greek Orthodox Patriarchate of Jerusalem and the Franciscan Custodian of the Holy Land on certain rights and privileges pertaining to the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem, built over the traditional site of Christ's birth.

Church circles in Jordan and Israel warmly welcomed the agreement as reflecting the new ecumenical spirit accentuated by the forthcoming visit to the Holy Land by Pope Paul VI.

Molten Gov. Deoud Abu Ghazal of Jerusalem, who ratified the agreement on behalf of King Hussein of Jordan, hailed the pact as a "historic document," ending long-standing disputes between the Greek Orthodox and Catholics who administer the Nativity church with the Armenians.
