The chalice of the late Sir Arthur J. Schnoop, South St. Road, Auburn, was given to the Most Rev. Fulton J. Sheen, Ph. D., D.D., of New York City, to be used by a foreign missionary priest.

The chalice of the late Sir Michael H. O'Connor was given to Rev. Albinus Leach, C.P. of Marbel Catubato, Philippine Islands. Father Leach is the son of Mrs. Frank J. Leach, 14 Easterly Ave., Auburn. Father Leach, a member of the Knights of Columbus, has been in the Philippine Islands for the past five or six years and is presently at home for a brief rest period. He will then return to the Islands for another lengthy stay in Catholic missionary work.

Mrs. Lena M. Hawelka, wife of the late Sir Charles F. Hawelka, 14 Liberty St., Auburn, presented his chalice to Rev. Gerald Feeley, a cousin. Father Feeley is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Morris Feeley of 309 LaForte Ave., Syracuse. Father Feeley is home, on leave from Africa, but will return to continue his Catholic missionary work.

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**St. Ann's School**  
**Open House in Hornell**

Hornell—Achievement in academic and artistic skills was illustrated colorfully Sunday when St. Ann's School held its annual open house.

Hundreds of parishioners and friends visited the classrooms during the afternoon and later attended the bazaar sponsored by St. Ann's Mothers Club in the assembly hall.

EACH OF THE rooms was decorated for Christmas and the public theme was emphasized by the traditional carols played over the school's public address system.

The coming Nativity of Christ was depicted in various media throughout the school. At the foot of the Crucifixion shrine in the foyer was a large statue of the manger enshrined in clouds of gold and turquoise "angel hair."

A large colored portrait of the late President Kennedy was hung against a star-studded red, white and blue background, which also bore an inscription from his inaugural address.

In the individual classrooms booklets on the desks contained samples of the pupils' work. Papers and booklets were displayed about the rooms in a variety of original ways. Each classroom had its own Nativity scene as a focal point of the Christmas motif.

A Santa Claus was a colorful figure in the primary grades in various art forms, some three-dimensional. Mobiles of snowflakes and Christmas tree ornaments, made by the youngsters, swayed from the lighting fixtures in some of the rooms.

Art appreciation emphasis was evident in the large colored reproductions of works by early and modern masters.

Modern mathematics as taught at St. Ann's was illustrated by pupil-made charts showing factoring and the partitive and quotative approaches to division.

Miniature three-dimensional logs marked each pupil's eighth grade English papers, 3 placed in Sister Mary Jobanna's room, showed techniques of

White-bearded Santas emerging from red chimneys were made into Christmas card holders by Mrs. Patricia O'Neill's kindergarten as gifts for their parents. A table display showed a large farm with rotating animals and a variety of fruits and vegetables collected by the youngsters in their study of the farm. Counting and beginning printing exercises were enclosed in colorful booklets.

Sister Mary Succurru, principal of St. Ann's School, greeted the visitors and assisted them in making appointments for parent conferences with teachers of their children, if they so desired.

**Rosary Crusade Draws 500,000**

Forto Alegre — (NC) — The Family Rosary Crusade climaxed a four-month mission in Brazil with a public rally that attracted a record-breaking attendance of approximately half a million people.

The rally was the climax to intensive preparatory sessions in neighborhoods, schools, colleges, universities, prisons, churches and hospitals.

Archbishop Alfredo Scherer of Forto Alegre presided at the rally and addressed the gathering. Father Patrick Peyton, C.S.C., director of the Family Rosary Crusade, also spoke, urging families to pray together each day, because "a world at prayer is a world at peace."
