## Africa, 20 Years Ahead in Faith

MONTREAL — (RNS) — Paul Emile Cardinal Léger, in clarifying what he called a "misinterpreted statement" concerning his month-long trip to African leper colonies, emphasized here he had no intention of resigning his post as Archbishop of Montreal.

Cardinal Léger, in a press conference on his return, then turned to details of his African trip which was undertaken shortly after adjournment of the Second Vatican Council.

"WHAT IS NEEDED in the world today," he said, "are true Christians who will contribute to many nations as they can afford to build five-dollar mud huts for Africans afflicted with leprosy.

"We must reach behind our frontiers to help fellowmen in their suffering."

The cardinal, dressed in African robes with a special cross on his chest, was seen by a group of African children.

## Spanish War Novel Given Noonday Review

"A great help to understand the mystery of the Spanish temperament, and the tragedy of the Spanish Civil War," said the reviewer of Jose Maria Gironella's "One Million Dollars in 1937" Tuesday's Noonday Book Review.

Mrs. Manfred Dapper, Spanish teacher at St. John Fisher College, reviewed the new Gironella novel at the Catholic Evident Library.

"NOT A CLASSIC, but a very good book, with a flowing natural style, well-constructed plot and great empathy," was her summation.

Gironella understands the dilemma of the Spanish people—that they tend to scorn moderation and have an "all or nothing" outlook; she went on. Thus when the Civil War of 1936-39 began, the Spanish people chose sides passionately and almost destroyed themselves.

"If nothing else, the novel reveals a new yearning for some middle ground on the part of the Spanish people. Those who survived the bitter holocaust realized that there had to be some 'grey area' in between the black and white opposites," she explained.

The plot is less a war story than a study of human reaction to the pain of a nation in strife. With a detachment and objectivity which are rather un-Spanish, the author paints a moving and vivid canvas of an enigmatic nation in the anguish of a civil war.

As a study of human values under tremendous strain, this book deserves a wide public," said Mrs. Dapper's final comment.
