Daniel Brent, associate superintendent of Rochester Catholic Schools.

In her proposal, Sister M. Janeska suggested possibilities for adequate research patterns among the students. Sister said Nazareth "is already engaged in a well-established audio-visual program which includes the use of overhead projectors."

In a letter to the principal, Bert S. Cross, president of 3-M Co. stated: "Your comprehensive and professional proposal has greatly impressed all of us and has reinforced the faith and confidence that we have long held in the teachers of America."
