

Georgetown Club Lists Foreign Service Dean

The Georgetown Club of Rochester has announced an address by William E. Moran, Jr., Dean of Georgetown's School of Foreign Service on the topic "Critical Foreign Policy Considerations."

This special dinner event in commemoration of Georgetown's 175th anniversary will be held Tuesday, Feb. 10, at the Rochester Club. Georgetown, the oldest Catholic college in the country, was founded in Washington, D.C. the same year the Constitution of the United States was adopted.

DEAN MORAN has held prominent positions with the State Department, Marshall Plan Mission and Atomic Energy Commission. Currently, he is on the Advisory Committee to the State Department's Bureau of African Affairs and is also consultant to the National Planning Association on African and Latin American studies. He is a frequent lecturer at the Foreign Service Institute and the National War College.

Bishop Kearney will preside at the dinner, which will be attended by local educational and business leaders as well as Georgetown alumni and friends.

Former Chief John Slattery Requiem Held

Solemn Requiem Mass for former Fire Chief John A. Slattery was offered in St. Monica's Church, Jan. 16. Chief Slattery, 78, of 21 Wellington Ave., died Monday, Jan. 13, 1958.

The Requiem Mass was celebrated by St. Rev. Francis C. Lambert assisted by Rev. Thomas E. Kline, pastor and Rev. Gerald E. Dunn, subdeacon.

In the sanctuary were: St. Rev. Magr. John M. Duffy, St. Rev. Magr. John V. Smith, the Reverend Fathers Robert Smith, Austin Hanna, James Slattery and William Sisson.

CHIEF SLATTERY was born Dec. 8, 1879. He attended the public schools and St. Monica's school. He worked at various occupations until he was appointed to the fire department in 1908. During his 47 years as a city fireman, he was hospitalized more than two dozen times for treatment of injuries, burns and smoke inhalation.

A sports enthusiast he played football with the old champion Jeffersons, forerunners of the present professional football team, and the West End team.

In the fire department he served five years as private, was promoted to lieutenant and in 1918 to captain. In 1928 he was named lieutenant chief, deputy chief in 1932 and chief, Dec. 24, 1934.

He was appointed fire marshal Jan. 27, 1938.

Chief Slattery was a member of Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus, Holy Name Society of St. Monica's Church.

A delegation from the Sheriff's office headed by Sheriff Al Skinner and Undersheriffs George A. Conway and a fire bureau delegation headed by Chief Joseph J. Donaghy and Fire Marshal John Buckley attended the funeral. Several were all fire chiefs of the Rochester Bureau.

Chief Slattery's first wife Ruth Slattery Slattery, died in 1945.

He is survived by his wife Mary (Leary) Slattery, two sons, John H. of New York City and Raymond G. of Rochester; six grandchildren; two great-grandchildren; one sister, Mrs. Eugene (Grace) Dunley, one brother, Raymond G. Slattery of Rochester; several nieces and nephews.

Burial was in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery where Rev. Monsignor Lambert officiated assisted by Reverend Fathers Hanna, Michael Tydings and Orrin Keller. Arrangements by Brotherick Funeral Home.

Geneva — Wills should be written so that they're clear when read by lay people and not so constructed that they will be misconstrued, misunderstood or misinterpreted.

This advice on "The Why and How of Wills" was presented to Court Annulation Catholic Daughters of America by Assistant District Attorney for Ontario County Robert Kennedy.

The speaker pointed out that in the case of persons without wills, there are laws that establish how real and personal property of the deceased will be distributed.

Wills, therefore, give an opportunity to establish how their property should be distributed.

Kennedy emphasized the importance of every owner of real or personal property having a will.
