

Cadet School Registration Set

Registration of new pupils for September 1964 will begin at Nazareth Hall Cadet School on Feb. 1 and continue until the limited number of pupils per class is reached.

Boys entering kindergarten must have reached the age of 5 by Dec. 1, 1964. The Kindergarten-Cadets follow an all-day program including the noon-day lunch, supervised play, and rest period. In addition to a course of study planned to discover the child's potential and give him the fundamental training necessary to develop it.

Boys registering for other grades must be recommended by the school they presently attend.

Nazareth Hall Cadet School, a private day school for boys, is conducted by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Rochester. The faculty is supplemented by teachers in the fields of French and physical education. Officers of the ROTC Unit at the University of Rochester supervise the military program.
