Theatre Conference Plans Film Awards

Washington, D.C. — (RNS) — For the first time the National Catholic Theatre Conference will present religious drama awards in the field of motion pictures.

It was announced here by Sister Mary Immaculate, the group's executive secretary-treasurer.

Named to receive the conference's first plaques for outstanding service in film were the script writers of "Lilies of the Field," and "The Reluctant Saint."

They were James Poe, script writer of "Lilies," based on a novella of the same name by William E. Barrett, and John Fante and Joseph Petracca, who wrote the original screenplay for "Saint," based on the life of St. Joseph of Cupertino, an Italian Franciscan priest of the 17th Century.

The Rochester Unit of the National Catholic Theatre Conference, which includes Catholic colleges, high schools, children's theatre and community groups of the diocese, is headed by Sister M. St. Gertrude, director of drama at Nazareth Academy.

The awards will be presented by the conference at its meeting in Detroit, Mich., Aug. 24-25. The conference also will give statuettes of St. Genadius, patron saint of actors, to the stars of both award-winning films.

They are Sidney Poitier, an American Negro, and Lilla Skala, Austrian-born actress for their roles as an ex-GI and Catholic mother superior, respectively, in "Lilies" and Maximilian Schell and Riccardo Montalban for "Saint."

At its sessions, the conference also will present its Alford E. Van Horn \$500 award for outstanding work in the drama to the Catholic University of America here. The award will go toward the university's \$1.5 million theater. This award is named after the Rev. F. George Dinneen, S.J., a co-founder of the NCTC.

"Lilies," produced and directed by Ralph Nelson, tells the story of a Negro Protestant former service man who helps a group of German nuns build a chapel in the Arizona desert. Its interreligious and interracial theme has won the film a number of top Protestant and Catholic awards.

"Saint" was produced and directed by Edward Dmytryk. St. Joseph of Cupertino, depicted in the film, was a simple, gentle, humble follower of St. Francis, who had no formal education. He was said to possess rare spiritual gifts and supernatural powers—the most remarkable being the power of levitation. He was canonized in 1767.

All Viennese Program Set

The Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra will perform an all-Viennese program in its next concert, scheduled for Thursday, Feb. 8, at the Eastman Theatre. Jasite Somogyi, who will guest-conduct the orchestra in a total of five concerts, will direct this performance.

The concert will feature Smetana's "Moldau," Strauss's "Symphony in E-flat," and Johann Strauss's "Overture to The Gypsy Baron," "Palcato Polka," "Blue Danube Waltz," and "Overture to Die Fledermaus."

Since 1958 Somogyi has been living in Switzerland, where he has gained an international reputation by conducting Europe's leading orchestras, including the Royal Philharmonic, Amsterdam's Concertgebouw, the Berlin Philharmonic, the Vienna Symphony Orchestra, and others. Since his American debut in 1961 with the Houston Symphony Orchestra, Somogyi has appeared with major American orchestras from coast to coast.

U.S. Catholic Schools On Wednesday TV

New York — (NC) — The CBS-TV network said here it will broadcast a special program about Catholic education and its role in federal aid to education controversy on Feb. 5.

Entitled "The Catholics and the Schools," the program is one of a "CBS Reports" series. It will be broadcast from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m. EST.

Catholic and public school educators, legislators and Federal officials will be participants. The operation of St. Mary Magdalene School, St. Louis, and of St. Thomas District High School, Pittsburgh, will be seen on the program, CBS said.

Noonday Meet Reviews Birth Control Book

Ninety per cent of married women are capable of using rhythm for family planning, claims a Catholic marriage expert in his new book, "BIRTH CONTROL AND CATHOLICS." This conclusion implies that proper medical advice is available and being used, writes Msgr. George A. Kelly, the author and Family Life Director of the Archdiocese of New York.

His book was reviewed by the Rev. Gerald Dunn, Rochester's Family Life Bureau director, last Tuesday at the Catholic Evidence Library.

"The author has always been known for his practical, down-to-earth approach," commented Father Dunn, "and this book, about a sensitive and controversial area, is no exception."

After delineating the Christian ideal of marriage, Msgr. Kelly indicates the modern factors which are exerting such pressure on the ideal. Of those mentioned, Father Dunn felt that the changing status of women was perhaps most significant.

"If the emancipated woman feels that child-bearing will hinder her efforts to achieve equality with men, she will be much more receptive to the idea of few or no children," he explained.

A dangerous trend in today's secularized world is the separation of sex and procreation. This has not only led to wide spread, contraceptive thinking in marriage, but an alarming increase in sex deviants.

"Man keeps tampering with human nature and trying to avoid God's plan for sex and marriage," commented Father Dunn.

"Whatever the temporary advantages of these unnatural solutions may be, the long-range results always prove disastrous," he went on.

The Kelly book predicts a rising number of abortions, the final desperate of those who have tried contraceptives and failed to impede conception.

"In the final analysis, the Catholic approach to this problem must include a realistic confidence in God's providence. Msgr. Kelly's treatment of this subject is indeed a welcome Father Dunn.
