Scholar Set By Hibernians

Guest speaker at the Hibernians' President John F. Kennedy Memorial and Commodore John Barry Banquet, Sat. Feb. 1, at Logan's Restaurant will be Father Conor O'Reilly, S.J., from County Cork, Ireland. Father O'Reilly is on a Fulbright Scholarship to the University of Rochester, where he is working as a Research Instructor in the Atomic Energy Project of Radiation Biology. He was educated by the Irish Christian Brothers in Dublin and entered the novitiate of the Society of Jesus in 1947. He took his undergraduate studies in Science at University College, Dublin, (National University of Ireland). Father O'Reilly was ordained a priest in Dublin, June 1950. Following his ordination, he pursued graduate studies in Biochemistry at University College in Dublin and received his Ph.D. in 1953. He expects to teach at University of Ireland or serve in the Foreign Missions.
