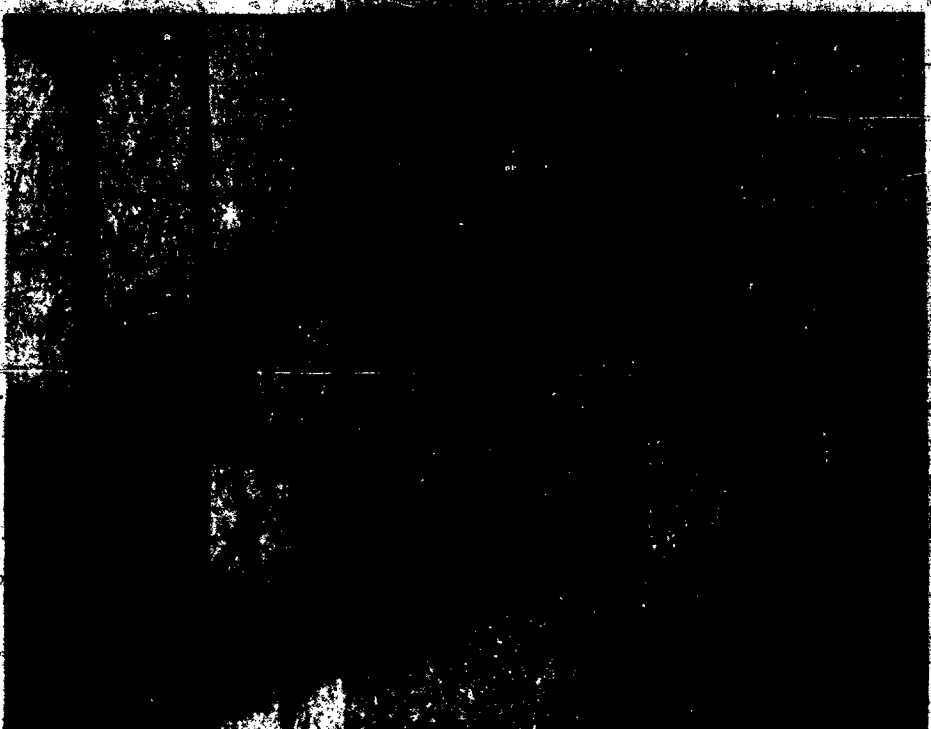

Detroit—(RNS)—Dr. Oscar Cullman, Lutheran World Federation delegate-observer to the Second Vatican Council, said here he had been refused permission to lecture at the University of Notre Dame in Rome. He was invited to lecture at two Roman Catholic universities in Rome.

The noted ecumenical leader told newsmen he was denied the lecturing privilege by the Pontifical Commission on Ecumenicity (Ecumenicity and the Pontifical Ecumenical Institute (Dominican).

His lecture was finally given at the French church of San Luigi in France. In Rome when French Catholic bishops intervened, some 1,000 persons, including bishops, gathered before the church of the Holy Spirit and Cardinal Luigi Bommarito.

Doctor Tells of Life In Native Philippines

Waverly—Dr. Remulo Bunsu, a physician on the staff at the Guthrie Clinic in Sayre, Pa., was the guest speaker at the regular monthly meeting of the Catholic Daughters of America, Court St. Jean of Arc, No. 235, in St. James Hall, Waverly.

A NATIVE OF QUEZON CITY, Philippines Islands, Dr. Bunsu showed slides of his homeland. One of the interesting facts noted was that in the summer there are no leaves on the trees, equivalent to our autumn, but in the winter, the rainy season, the vegetation is very green.

Dr. Bunsu also showed slides of rice terraces which is one of the old wonders of the world and a throwback to the stone age. As there is a wet and dry season in the islands, the rice is tilled and planted in the wet season.

Also shown were shops which are out in the open and where purchasing is made by bargaining for the items.

Dr. Bunsu also stated that 93 per cent of the population on the islands are Christians, 83 per cent Catholic and 10 per cent Protestants and Muslims.
