Some Windows Still Closed

Detroit—(RNS)—Dr. Oscar Cullman, Lutheran World Federation delegate-observer to the Second Vatican Council, said here he had been refused permission to lecture at the University of Toronto as a result of his participation in the 1962-63 Roman Catholic synod.

The noted ecumenical leader told newsmen he was denied the lecturing privilege by the Pontifical Commission on Unity (Unity and the Pontifical Anglican Institute (Dominican). His lecture was finally given at the French church of San Luigi in France, in Rome when French Catholic bishops intervened. Some 1,000 persons, including bishops, priests, nuns, laymen and women, attended the lecture. Dr. Cullman said he was given a "family altar" by the Vatican.

Dr. Bunsu also showed slides of rice terraces which is one of the old wonders of the world and a throwback to the stone age. As there is a wet-and-dry season in the islands, the rice is killed and planted in the wet season.

Also shown were shops which are out in the open and where purchasing is made by bargaining for the items.

J. V. Gilboe Requiem Sung

Solemn funeral Mass for J. Vincent Gilboe was offered in St. Monica Church, Jan. 29. Mr. Gilboe, 78, of 140 Congress Ave. died Jan. 26, 1964 after a long illness.
