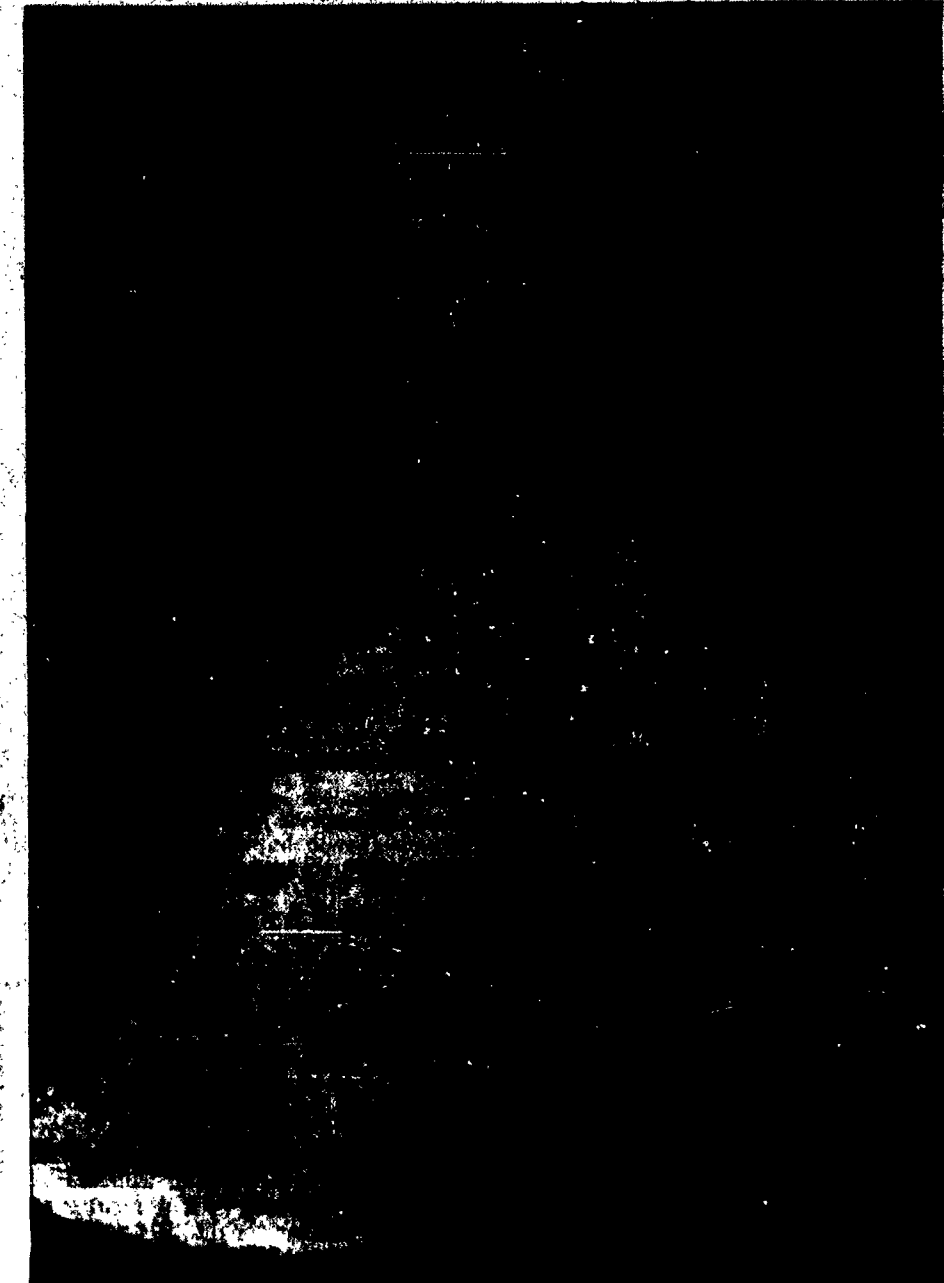

Paris Cardinal Critic of Play

Paris-(NC)—Cardinal Faith of Paris has criticized German playwright Rolf Hochhuth's "The Deputy" following outbreak of violence at the Paris opening of the play.

The play criticizes the late Pope Pius XII for not speaking out against Nazi persecution of Jews.

The play's premiere here was interrupted by spectators shouting: "It is a scandal, it is shameful. It is absolutely blasphemous."

The demonstrators jumped up onto the stage and reproached the actors. Others at the play called the demonstrators fascists and Hitlerites in quieting the outbreak, police made arrests.
