Becket
Recommendation: A copy of Jean Anouilh's play of the same title, produced against magnificent settings and filmed with beautifully appropriate photography, this major motion picture portrays the historical conflict between Henry II of England and Thomas a Becket, Archbishop of Canterbury, saint and martyr. The literary script and sensitive direction, while not concerned with sounding the supernatural depths of Becket's holiness, nevertheless achieves, with great respect and wonder, a mature drama about integrity of conscience. Becket is a film which is specially recommended to the attention of adult audiences; under proper direction adolescents might also view it with profit.

Note: This recommendation and this classification are restricted to the American version of the film.

Doctor Strangelove

Observation: Billed as a "nightmare comedy," this film about the possibility of a worldwide nuclear holocaust will be received by many as a brilliant satire on the military mind and our defense policy. Others will see it as irreverent and even dangerous buffoonery which is just as satirical in its own way as the concept of the defense establishment which it purports to satirize. Reservations are also indicated because the director has endeavored to elicit too many of the laughs from vulgar references and symbols which are unnecessary to the development of his theme. An A-V classification is given.

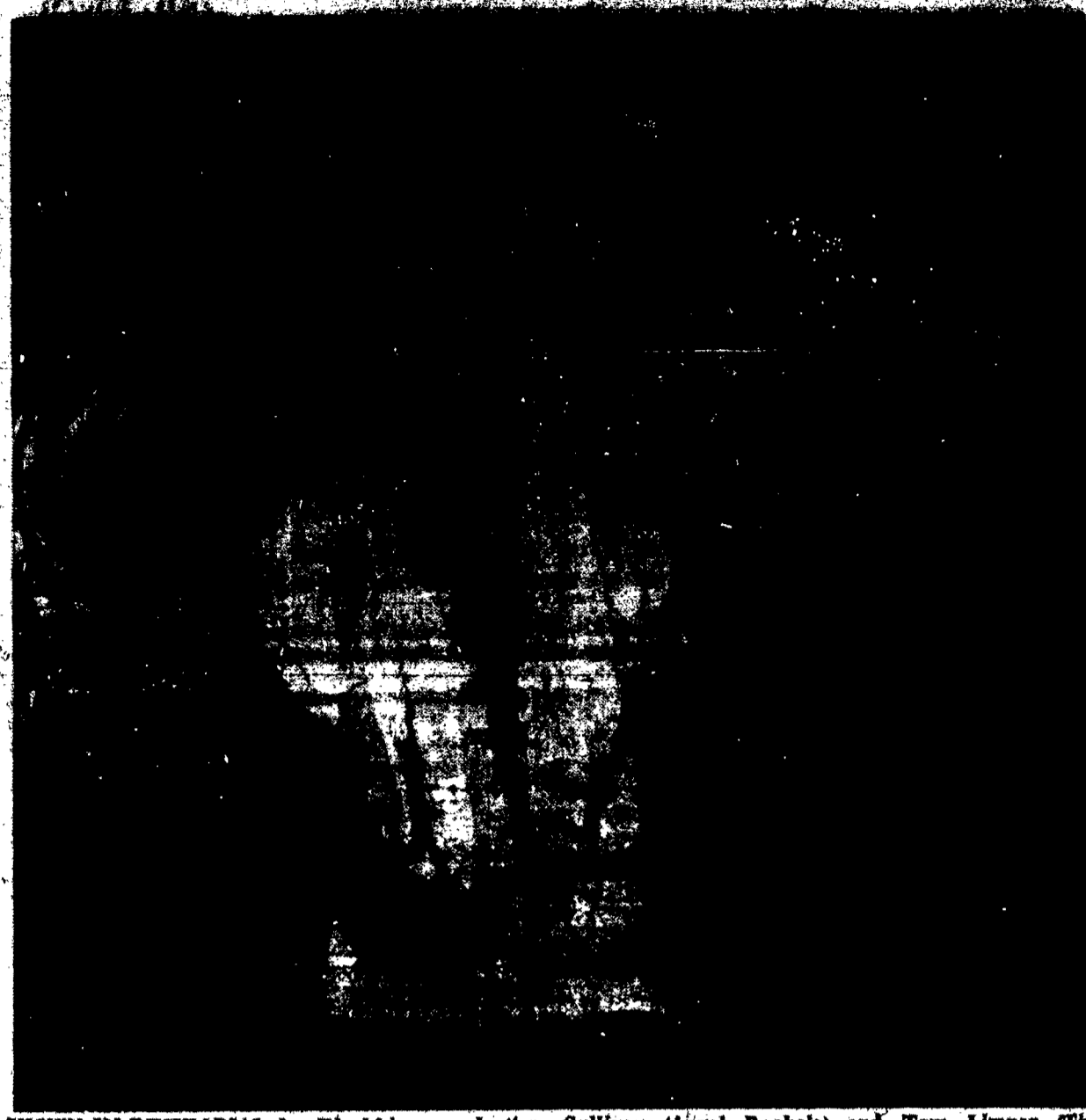

Blackfriars Play Opens Tonight

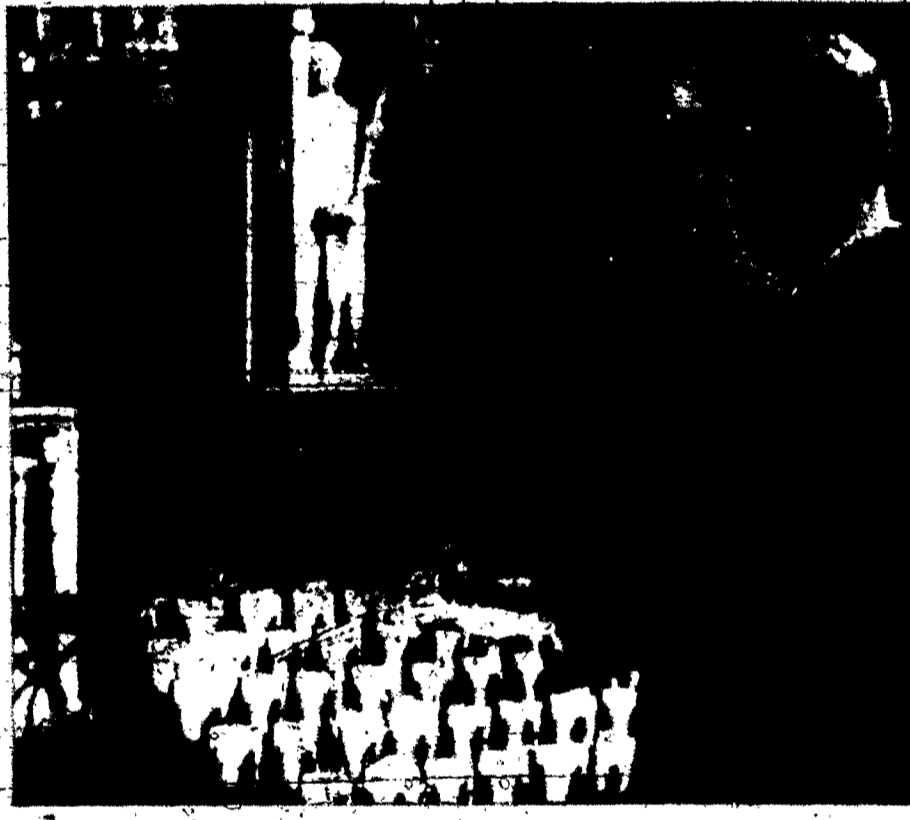

Prelate Tells Of Shift At Council

Detroit — (RNS) — Archbishop John F. Bearden of Detroit, speaking before some 350 Protestant, Orthodox and Jewish clergymen, predicted here that the Second Vatican Council will endorse schema chapters on Jewish-Christian relations and religious liberty at its next sessions.

His prediction came before a meeting of the Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches at the Jefferson Avenue Presbyterian church. Council officials said Archbishop Bearden's appearance was the first by a Roman Catholic prelate before the organization.

Archbishop Bearden is a member of the Secretariat for Promoting Christian Unity, which drew up the draft on ecumenism considered by the Ecumenical Council.

The first session of the Council (which ended in 1962) was marked by a period of drift and confusion, according to Archbishop Bearden. Evidence of accomplishment came in the second session, he said, setting the acceptance and promulgation of changes in the liturgy and the communications decree.

The Detroit prelate said many Council Fathers had changed their views during that session, largely because of persuasive and compelling discussions on the Council floor. If a poll had been taken before the Council opened, he said, it would have indicated rejection — not approval, as later occurred — of use of the vernacular in the Mass.

Science Program Set For Youth

A special science program for youth on Leonardo da Vinci will be presented at Rochester Museum of Arts and Sciences, on Saturday, Feb. 15, at 10:15 a.m. and at 11:15 a.m. Two Leonardo da Vinci films — one on his life, his times and his art and the other on "His Inventions" will be shown.

Scale models of 20 of Leonardo da Vinci's inventions are on display at the museum. These were constructed from the original working drawings and his notebooks by Roberto Guattelli. Leonardo da Vinci's vision of the airplane, helicopter, parachute, machine gun, armored tank, rotating bridge and many others are reflected in many machines we use today.

New York — (NC) — The National Legion of Decency has "specially recommended" to the attention of adult audiences the movie "Becket." The Paramount picture is based on the 12th-century conflict between St. Thomas a Becket, Archbishop of Canterbury, and England's King Henry II. The film has Richard Burton in the title role with Peter O'Toole as King Henry II.

The legion evaluated the picture in its A-3 classification (generally unobjectionable for adults) with the notation that under proper direction adolescents might also view it with profit.

Child, Topic For Meeting

Washington — (NC) — Experts in theology, medicine, law, sociology, marriage, counseling and other fields related to family life education will join some 1,000 delegates at the 29th National Catholic Family Life convention here June 25 to 28.

"The Glory of the Child" will be the theme of the convention sponsored by the Family Life Bureau, National Catholic Welfare Conference.

The Washington meeting, which will discuss the rights of the child within the context of family and society in the U.S., will serve as a follow-up to the World Congress on the Rights of the Child, held last April in Beirut, Lebanon, under the auspices of the International Catholic Child Bureau and the Catholic International Education Office, the NCWC Bureau said.

Basic documents to be used by the family life leaders at the convention, in addition to papal encyclicals on the subject, will be the U.N. Universal Declaration on Human Rights (1948) and the U.N. Declaration on the Rights of the Child (1959), it was announced.
