

### Requiem For Mother, Son Offered At St. Monica's

Funeral Mass for Mrs. Johanna A. Cronin and her son, Patrick Neil Cronin was offered by Rt. Rev. Msgr. Gerald C. Lambert in St. Monica's Church, Friday, Feb. 7. Mrs. Cronin, 90, Kron St. died Feb. 4, 1964, a half hour before her son who succumbed from a heart attack on being told of his mother's death. He resided with his mother at 90 Kron St.

Assisting Monsignor Lambert in the solemn Requiem Mass were: Rev. Thomas C. Kane, St. Ann's; Rev. E. Duma, St. Ann's; Rev. Arthur E. Buhag and Rev. Austin B. Hanna attended.

MR. CRONIN, 82, was a stock broker. He owned Cronin and Co. in the Granite Bldg., 130 Main St. since 1935. He was a graduate of Cathedral High School and was long a friend of the Catholic Courier. He served in the Navy in World War I.

He was a member of the Knights of Columbus, Knights of Equity, American Legion and the Rochester Club.

Mrs. Cronin was the widow of William Cronin who died in 1908. Born in Crookston, Ont., Canada, she came here 56 years ago.

She was a member of the Rosary Society of St. Monica's Church.

Mr. Cronin was survived by one sister, Mrs. Anne Cahill of New York City; two brothers, Burt J. and William J. Cronin and several nieces and nephews. Mrs. Cronin is survived by her daughter, Mrs. Cahill, her two sons, Burt and William; two grandchildren, Robert Cronin and Mrs. John (Barbara) Sullivan of Albany; five great-grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

### Vatican Discontinues Three Patriarchates

Vatican City — (NC) — The Vatican has done away with the titular Latin Rite patriarchates of Constantinople, Alexandria and Antioch, long considered the most important of the Eastern Churches.

The only Latin patriarchate remaining in the Middle East is that of Jerusalem.

All three of the Latin Rite patriarchates now dropped had been vacant for a decade or more, the last three popes choosing not to fill them. They returned from the time of the Crusades. After the Latin Christian patriarchate of Constantinople in 1204 and set up their own short-lived kingdom there. Pope Innocent III appointed a Latin Rite Venetian as Patriarch of Constantinople. Historians re-

gard this act as putting the final touch on the schism which had split the sees of Rome and Constantinople in 1054. The Orthodox considered the appointment of Latin patriarchs to the ancient Eastern sees presumptuous and arrogant.

After the period of the Crusades, the Latin patriarchates of Constantinople, Alexandria and Antioch became titular honors. The Latin patriarchs virtually always lived in Italy, had no jurisdiction, but took ritual precedence over archbishops and bishops.

### Dominican Missioners Slated At St. Mary's

Auburn — The Dominican Fathers will conduct a Mission in St. Mary's Church, Auburn, beginning Feb. 16 and closing March 1, according to an announcement by a short instruction.

Dominican priests conducting the mission will be the Rev. John P. Sullivan, O.P. and the Rev. Edward M. Gaffney, O.P.

Father Sullivan was ordained in Washington, D.C. in 1941. He has taught at the Dominican Houses of Study at Somerset, Ohio, and Washington, D.C., and in Columbus, Ohio. He served as chaplain and teacher at Mercy Hospital, Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio, and at St. Mary's Church, New Haven, Conn. Since 1958 he has given retreats, novenas and missions. ### Catholic Schools Neglect Church Social Teachings

New Orleans — (RNS) — Father Louis J. Twomey, S.J., director of Loyola University's Institute of Industrial Relations, told laymen here they face the task of overcoming "the deficiencies with which you came out of your Catholic schools."

The past failure of Catholic education to teach the social doctrine of the Church, he said, "has resulted in Catholicism seeming irrelevant in society."

Father Twomey spoke at a weekend institute in theology for the laity sponsored by Xavier University of New Orleans and Friends House, a Catholic lay organization in Chicago.

IGNORANCE of the Church's social doctrine, he said, "is completely baffling and a reflection of the whole concept of what we mean by the faith."

Some Catholics, he added, see an contradiction between membership in the Daughters of the Holy Name Society and the Catholic Church.

### Two Pilgrims Eyes Fixed On Christ

Jerusalem — (NC) — Following in the text of the communion issued jointly by Pope Paul VI and Patriarch Athenagoras I of Constantinople at the close of their second meeting Jan. 8.

At the end of their meeting in Jerusalem, the Holy Father Paul VI and the Ecumenical Patriarch Athenagoras, in agreement with his Holy Synod, have together acknowledged the great significance of this event and have given thanks to Almighty God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, who has guided their steps to the Holy Land where our common Redeemer, Christ our Lord, lived, taught, died, rose again and ascended into heaven, whence He sent down the Holy Spirit upon the infant Church.

This meeting cannot be considered otherwise than as a fraternal gesture inspired by the charity of Christ, who left to His disciples the supreme commandment of loving one another, of forgiving offenses even to seventy times seven, and of being united one with another.

The two pilgrims, with their eyes fixed on Christ, the Exemplar and Author with the Father in unity and peace, pray to God that this meeting may be the sign and prelude of things to come for the glory of God and the illumination of His faithful people.

After so many centuries of silence they have now come together in putting God's will into effect and in proclaiming the age-old truth of His Gospel entrusted to the Church.

These common sentiments are manifested to all the members of their respective hierarchies and to all the faithful so that they too may participate in them and offer to God renewed prayers that the truth of the one only Church of Christ and of His Gospel, light and salvation of the world, may shine with ever greater brightness in the sight of all Christians.
