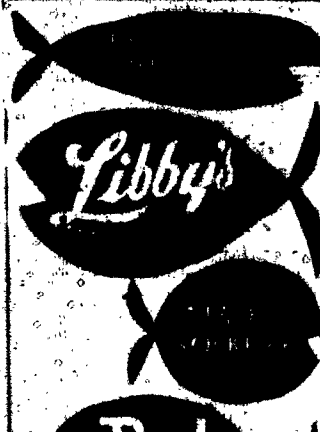

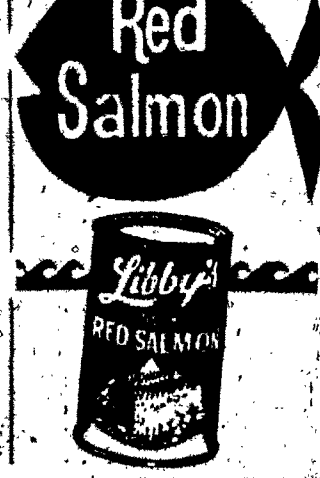

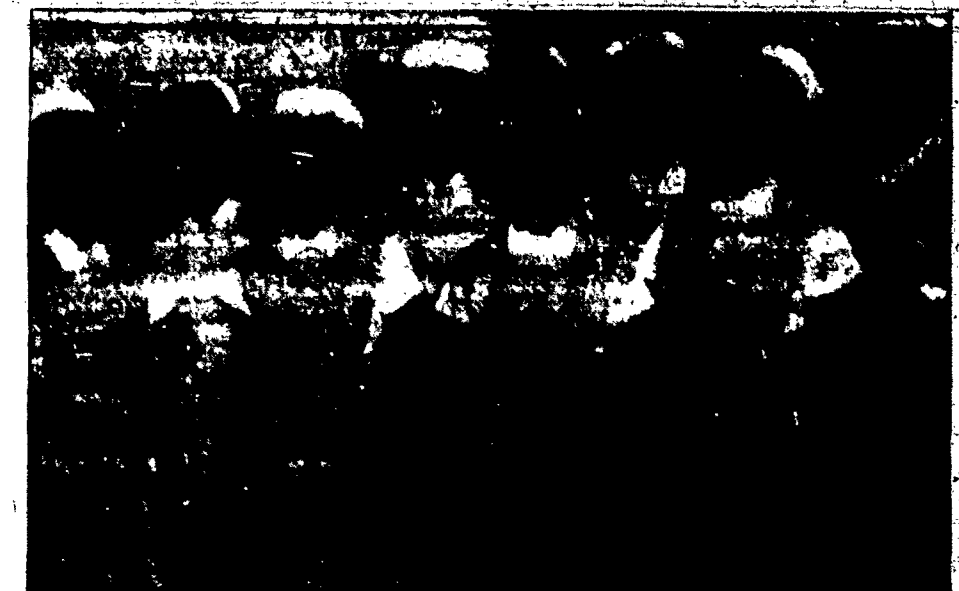

### Canada Shrine's Priest Talks In Clifton Springs

Clifton Springs — The Altar and Rosary Society, Clifton Springs, had a film presentation in St. Felix Church Hall. Sixty guests were present. The films were on St. Anne de Beaupre, Our Lady of the Cape and Winter Carnival, Quebec City which is similar to our Mardi Gras during the Pre-Lenten Season.

The films were shown by Fr. Jacques Rinfret, O.M.I., Pilgrimage Director at the Shrine of Our Lady of the Cape, Cap-de-la-Madeleine, Que., Canada who was invited by Father Francis Turner, pastor at St. Felix and Mrs. John Curran, president of the society in Clifton Springs.

Father Rinfret visits the United States each year to show films on the Shrine of Our Lady of the Cape to propagate the Shrine to the American people.
