

Last Rites For Teachers, Sisters of Saint Joseph

Funeral Masses for two Sisters of St. Joseph who died during the week were offered at the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph Motherhouse Chapel, Solemn Requiem Mass for Sister M. Alphonsus Granville, who died Feb. 12, 1964 was offered Feb. 18 and the Solemn Requiem for Sister Rose Cecilia LeFrois who died Feb. 16, 1964 was celebrated on Wednesday, Feb. 18.

Rev. Albert H. Schnacky celebrated the Mass for Sister Alphonsus assisted by Rev. William M. Roche, deacon; Rev. John M. Quigley, subdeacon and Rev. James F. ... master of ceremonies.

SISTER ALPHONSUS taught in Rochester diocesan schools 25 years. This period covered teaching in St. Patrick's School, Mt. Morris; St. Mary's School, Canandaigua; Holy Apostles School, Rochester; St. Ambrose School, from 1929 to 1939; and St. Monica's School from 1951 to 1954.

Her last assignment was in St. Mary's School, Elmira, from which she retired in 1960 because of illness.

Sister Alphonsus whose father was a soldier in the British Army, was born in Wallington, India. Her father was transferred to England and then to Ireland where her mother died in 1910. At 16, Sister Alphonsus and her sister, Mrs. John G. Granville, Rochester came to the United States.

Sister Alphonsus because of her youth was denied admittance until authorities learned her aunt in Illinois would take care of her.

Four years after her arrival, Sister Alphonsus entered the Congregation in Ithaca.

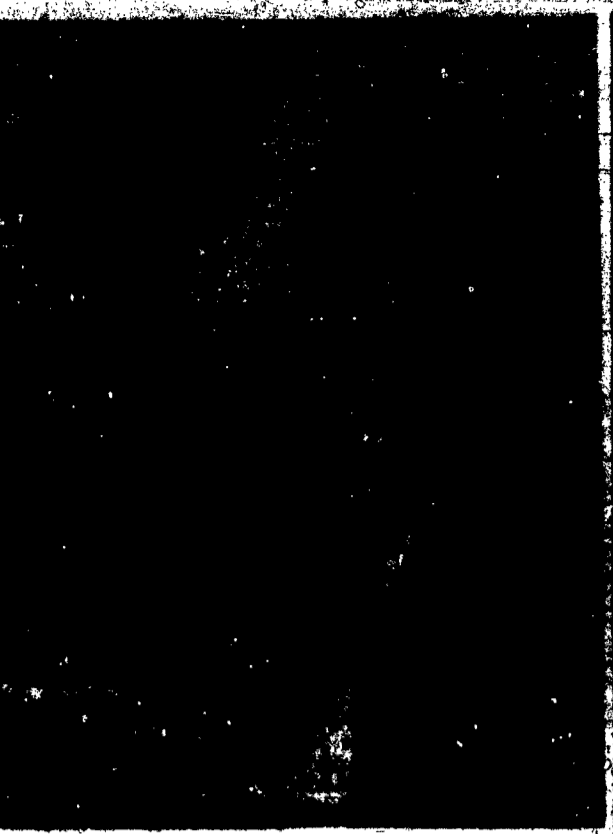
