## Final Session

The Rochester Area Debate League will hold its eighth and final session, Saturday morning, Feb. 22, at Aquinas Institute. ## Test Results

Excellence in scholarship knows no parish boundaries in Rochester according to a recent report from Aquinas Institute's vice principal, Rev. Leon G. Hart, C.S.B.

In announcing results of the mid-year examinations taken this month at the Basilian Fathers' school, Father Hart pointed out that the four top-ranking students are from parishes in four divergent sections of the city.

David Hull of St. Helen's parish led the entire student body of Aquinas with an average of 89.39 per cent. Martin Drilling of Holy Rosary parish and Stephen Kinsky of St. Boniface parish ranked next with a 87.38 average. James Chiorio of St. Ambrose parish was fourth with a 87.05 average.

Father Hart also stated that the averages of honor students have risen markedly over the past five years. He noted that the New York State Regents results. Although not venturing a reason for the higher marks, Father Hart indicated that the students are more than ever being challenged to develop creative and analytical thinking as well as to excel in every sphere of human activity. "Motivation," he said, "is one of the principal factors influencing students' work and family support is the best spur to intellectual effort."

Over one quarter of the Aquinas students won scholastic honors in the semester examinations. Other boys ranking in the top ten, in addition to Hill, Drilling, Kinsky and Chiorio, are Gerard Duffy of Holy Rosary parish, 87.33; Gregory Flynn of Holy Family parish, 87; Dennis Bonisgnoro of Holy Apostles and Phillip Magano of Blessed Sacrament parish with an average of 86.83; Dennis Bronka of St. Thomas parish, 86.75 and Torrance Ackerman of St. Monica's parish, 85.50.

Students maintaining an average of 80 per cent for the entire school year will be eligible for membership in the St. Thomas Club, Aquinas' highest scholastic achievement.

## Honor Roll

Forty-seven McQuaid Jesuit High School students attained first honors for the first semester, leading an honor roll of 266 names. The current McQuaid enrollment is 778.

Top students in their respective years were senior J. This afternoon at the third Honors Assembly at St. Agnes High School this year, Sister Marie Margaret will give public recognition to the successful efforts of 283 students who, at the completion of their first term's work, have earned places on the First and on the Second Honor Roll.

Students attain rank on the First Honor Roll if they have an average of 90% or above, if they have "Satisfactory" or better ratings in all character traits, and if they have no more than three periods of absence.

To attain Second Honor, a student's average must be at least 85%, and the student must meet the other requirements of the First Honor Roll. Leading the senior class is Mary Mulvihill with an average of 97.2, followed by April Buben, 94.3, Sandra Morrison, 94.0, Beverly Wagner, 93.3, and Diane Tabor, 93.2. Thirty-two seniors are listed on the First Honor Roll, fifty-eight on the Second.

The five top juniors are Linda Pfeifer 95.8, Mary Egan 95.5, Eleanor Celenanti 95.1, Kristine Quetschenbach 94.3, and Victoria Vitkus 94.0. Twenty-two juniors rank on the First Honor Roll, thirty-five on the Second.

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Carol Uebelacker heads the sophomore list with a 94.8 average followed by Patricia Shaughnessy, 95.8, Mary Lou Larkin 94.8, Ann VandenHooven 94.5 and Mary Doherty 94.3.
