## Wrestling Tourney Planned Saturday

Bishop Kearney High School will host the first all Catholic Wrestling Tournament ever held in New York State. The tournament will be a one day affair, scheduled for the Bishop Kearney High gym on Saturday, Feb. 22.

Six teams from western New York Catholic High Schools will be competing for the unofficial championship title of New York State. St. Mary High School of Lancaster is the early tournament favorite. They are coached by a former Brighton resident, Ed Sullivan. St. Mary's has long been a Catholic wrestling powerhouse since they started the sport about ten years ago.

This season they bring a 12-1-1 team record into the tournament, with their tie being against Bishop Kearney High School. They have on their squad several outstanding college prospects: Bill Clark (13-1) at 130 lbs.; Don Pfobli (14-0); Paul Troubridge (14-0). One of the tournaments outstanding matches could come when Bill Clark again meets Dan Oberst of Bishop Kearney High. Earlier in the year, Oberst defeated Clark, 5 to 6, for Clark's only loss of the year. Oberst is undefeated thus far this year, having taken second place in the Eastridge Christmas Tournament.

Other teams entered in the tournament are the host team from Bishop Kearney High, Mc-

## Notre Dame Highlights

Two Jesuit Fathers from Auriesville, one of whom is a lawyer, conducted the annual Lenten retreat at Notre Dame this week. Father Donald Keefe, S.J., a member of the Washington, D.C. Bar, the New York State Bar and the U.S. Supreme Court Bar, led the boys' sessions while Father Calvin Poulton, S.J., who has taught in the Philippines, was in charge of the girls' sessions.

Two separate schedules, running concurrently, gave the students the opportunity to examine their spiritual lives in the light of the graces of an annual retreat. Conferences, discussions and spiritual reading kept them occupied for the last three days.

Extensive preparation, letters to the parents and daily bulletins to the homes all lent an atmosphere of importance and solemnity to the most important item on the student calendar during the course of any school year.

The JV contest will match victory string against victory string. Academy's juniors have gone through 17 games without a setback. The little Crusaders haven't lost since this same team beat them 65-49 eight games ago. —JOE BOGARDUS

Suggested by Tom Eyrno, editor of the Sunday Telegram, the members of the journalism class conducted a school-wide survey a week ago in all the English classes.
